The Practical Question.

(Montreal Star.)

The practical question for Canadians today is simply this: "Has the Senate, exercised its constitutional powers wisely to the interests of the Dominion?"

Let us answer this question in Scotch fashion by asking one or two more:

Was the Senate's action in the Baie des Chaleurs case justified?

Has the Senate's action in the Drummond County Railway case been justified by the improvements already secured in the contract, and by the revelations made by Mr. Greenshields?

Is the Senate justified, today, in declaring that the trade of the Canadian Yukon shall be reserved to Canadians, that the gold lands of the Canadian Yukon shall be kept for the people of Canada, and that thousands of gold-seekers shall not be lured to starvation through the manifestly false promises of a Canadian Government.

There is a strictly constitutional method of finding out whether public opinion on the Government's Yukon policy is better represented by the Senate or by the House of Commons, and that is by an appeal to the country. The matter is an important one for Canada. The gold discoveries afford boundless possibilities for national development. The Conservatives take the ground that the Government's policy tends to the permanent ruin of all Canada's interests in this latest and greatest source of national wealth. The issue is a straight one, and its importance is vital. Even Ministers admit the tremendous importance of this question. If they are quite sure that public opinion is with them why not appeal to the country?

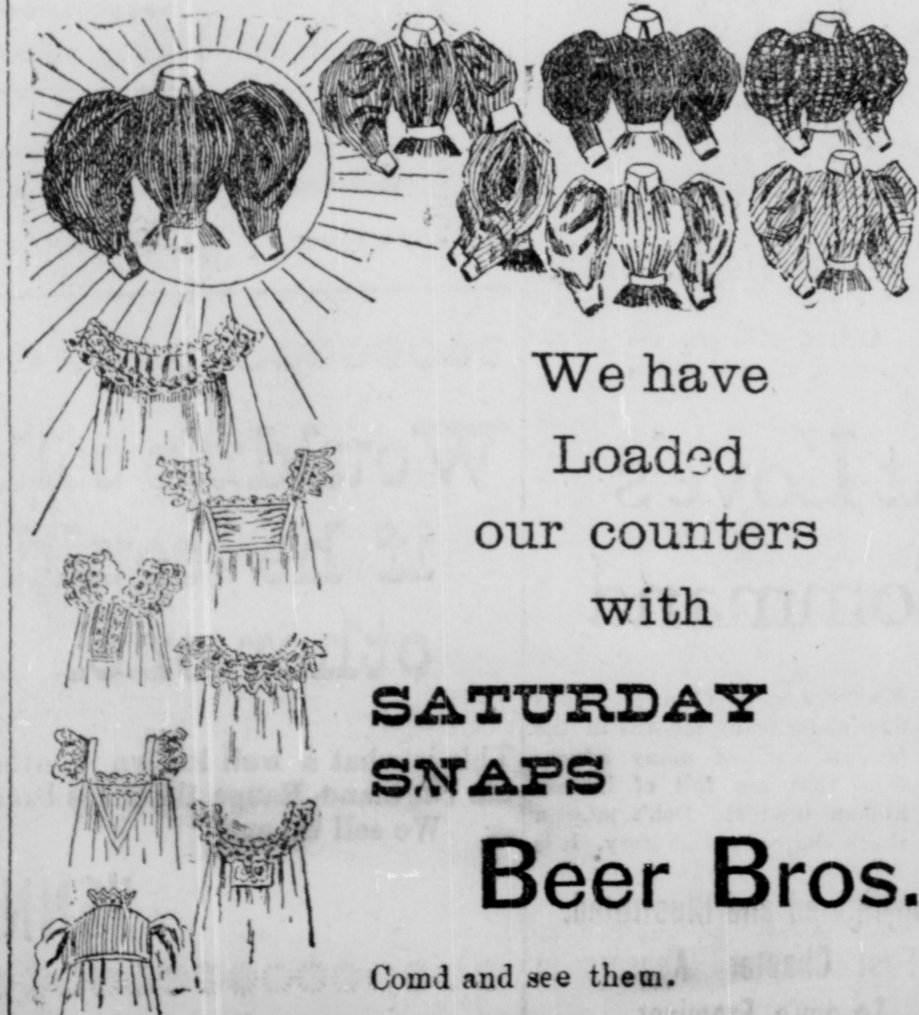
