Farm Clubs Sending Help

The Toronto Maple Leafs took the bull by the tail when they tackled the Habs in Toronto Wednesday evening and there is no doubt that they came out second best. As name only too well known to the countless Canadian fans was the big factor in the game and it is about time that the Richard name got back into the headlines. Henri or the "Pocket Rocket" as he is affectionately known by his numerous fans broke a 1-1 deadlock in the third period as Tremblay and Provost set him up perfectly. Richard also played a strong all around game and could have had at least two more tallies with a bit of luck. He and Jean Guy Talbot had a two man break with no one back but Talbot's pass was behind him and ruined the play. Then too he was robbed several times by the brilliant play of Terry Sawchuk.

The power play again played an integral part in this game for both the Habs and the Leafs potted their tallies with a man advantage. Dave Keon, who is finally beginning to show the form that has made him one of the true stars of the league for the past few years, potted the Leafs only marker at the 9:13 mark in the second period. Here is a man from which small hockey players can take heart for although he is one of the smallest men in the NHL he is rated with the best.

However the game gives some indication of the traditional rivalry between the two clubs that will now be carried on again with some degree of suspense this season. It looked at the first of the year and the Leafs would be just a playmate for the rest of the stronger clubs but now that they have seen fit to take NINE new players onto the roster they look at least a little bit better.

Toronto has one of the best farm systems of the NHL clubs and people have been wondering for the past few years just why they kept it, except that they could sell all their young talent to the other clubs. The classic example in the 1963-64 version of the Toronto Marlboros. This junior club had a lineup that could give most any team in the country a good go. Rod Selling, (the Leafs or rather Imlach deemed it fit that he be sold to the Rangers) Ellis, Stenmarkowski, and others who slip my mind at the moment donned Marlboro garb that season. Had Toronto taken a few of these youngsters last season or the season before they would be almost a cinch to be on at least par with the Habs.

However this was not the case. Imlach decided to go with the veterans for one last season and it cost him a chance to even get in past the series as the Habs outkicked the old legs of the Leafs. However this year it is a different story for the Leafs can at least stay with the pace (or have so far). However they lack the experience to make them real Stanley Cup material.

The Habs are the classic example of what a good farm system and the knowledge of how to use it can sustain a club. The old master, Toe Blake has the youngest but most solid squad in the six team loop and it has been mostly obtained from his farm system.

Then too a great many players that have been brought up through the minors by the Habs, and the Leafs too for that matter, are sold or traded to the other clubs who supposedly have adequate farm system of their own. No easy chore for two clubs to supply six. Then too a great deal more pressure is going to come to bear on the farm systems when the new NHL clubs come into the league. Let us hope that they are not so demanding of the Minors as so they ruin the caliber of play in "the worlds fastest game."

The following is a clipping released by the Athletic Department of Dalhousie University:

The Dalhousie University Basketball Tigers, led by a pair of outstanding performances by Centre Kevin White, posted two victories in exhibition play last weekend. On Saturday evening the Tigers dumped the Dalhousie "Alumni" 115-47 while on Sunday they defeated the Montreal Generals 99-37. The Generals, members of the Senior "A" level Eastern Canada Basketball Conference were led by Warren Sutton, former student of Acadia.

White, a freshman arts student from Charlottetown and a graduate of St. Dunstan's High School fired 17 points in the Saturday game and hit on eight of twenty one attempts for 16 points against the Montreal team. In addition White dominated the backboards grabbing seventeen rebounds in Sunday's game.

The Tigers make their next start on December 3 when they face Rickers College of Houlton, Maine in the first round of the Tip Off Tournament by Acadia University.

Fans looking for sweater No. 21 in a bid to spot Ken Nielsen, Winnipeg Blue Bombers sensational rookie end, in Saturday's Grey Cup game won't find it. It is gone. A souvenir hunter made off with it after the talented 23-year-old became a football hero by catching two touchdown passes to spark Winnipeg to a 19-12 triumph over Calgary Stampeders in the third and deciding game of the Western Conference final last Saturday. "It was stolen out of his bag in the dressing room," said equipment manager Bob Jones. Nielsen, obtained in a trade with Hamilton Tiger-Cats last August, will wear No. 28 Saturday.

Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League announced Thursday centre Ed Joyal has been sent to Rochester Americans of the American Hockey League. Rookie Mike Walton will take his place on the Leaf squad. Joyal, acquired from Detroit Red Wings in a major trade earlier in the year, has not scored a goal and has earned only two assists since the season opened. In four games with the Leafs, Walton has scored one goal and assisted on two. Prince Of Wales Squad Wallops Rogers Rangers

It was a night for the sharpshooters at the Forum last evening as Prince of Wales Welshmen and Rogers Rangers battled through 60 minutes of hockey and averaged a little over a goal and a penalty every three minutes. The Welshmen dominated the play in all three periods and came out on the top side of a 16-5 goalfest.

Jamie Kennedy added another seven points to his collection as he banged in three goals and set up another four assists. Jean Paul Cyr added another three tallies, Andy Arsenault and Bobby Doherty got two while Carl Duncan, John Rodgers, Don Ellis, Joey Brown, Barry Turner and Gus Houston accounted for the remaining scores. For Rogers both MacDougalls got a brace of goals while Don Iose Chandler whipped a blistering slap shot past Ellis.

The first period belonged exclusively to the Welshmen. With the play having been excellent up until the 10 minute mark and Rogers having had more than their share of chances, the game suddenly broke wide open as the PWC club capitalized on a man advantage at the 10:20 mark. Carl Duncan had nothing more to do than blast his shot past a startled Claybourne as Kennedy centered the puck. Boston Tramples Rangers; Black Hawks Edge Detroit

BOSTON (AP) — Bob Woytowich and Don Awrey, the only healthy members of Boston's regular defence corps, scored second-period goals Thursday night to help the Bruins to a 6-2 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers.

Woytowich broke a 2-2 tie early in the second period with his first goal of the season, a long, screened shot from the blue line.

Midway through the session Awrey, normally the Bruins' fifth defenceman, scored his first goal with a shot from the blue line while the Rangers were shorthanded.

Woytowich and Awrey teamed as a defence pair. Barry Ashbee, summoned from Hershey of the American League, and Ed Westfall, normally a right winger, formed another pairing.

Defencemen Ted Green and Al Langlois were sidelined with injuries. Veteran Leo Boivin sat on the bench with a bruised knee after the first period.

The Rangers quickly tied the count on Bob Nevin's 10th goal and Garry Peters' third.

Woytowich and Awrey did the second-period scoring. Parker MacDonald and Fleming added goals in the last period for Boston.

A crowd of 13,909, the third straight sellout at the Boston Garden, gave the Bruins a standing ovation for the final minute of the game.

The Rangers dominated the action in the first two periods, outshooting the Bruins 30-23. But Boston took command in the third period and Peppers New York goalie Ed Giacomin with 16 shots in the final 20 minutes.

Boston's rookie goalie Bernie Parent shook off the effects of a hard drive by Nevin at 1:09 of the second period to remain in the game. Nevin's slap shot struck Parent's face mask, which saved the 20-year-old net-

minder from possible serious injury.

Parent had 18 saves in the middle period.

Goalkeeper Glenn Hall starred for the Hawks, turning back 38 Detroit shots, several from almost point-blank range.

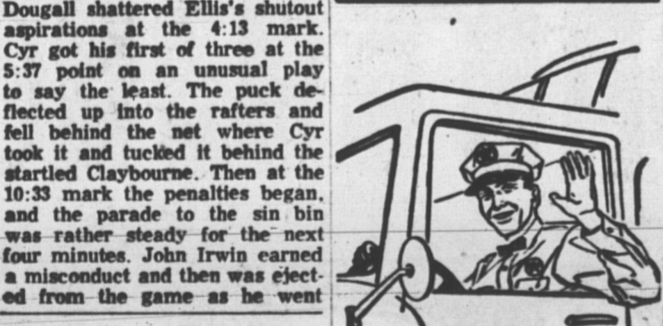
