

Orwell and Vernon River Bridge

Following is a statement of the shipping done at Orwell and Vernon River Bridge for the season of 1893:—

Lily Rivers, Pictou, ballast; Reflex, Kenneliv, Hawkesbury, 200 bushels potatoes; Julia A, Penny, Charlottetown, 40 barrels oysters; Ethel Blanche, Reynolds, Charlottetown, 20 barrels oysters; Ethel Blanche, Reynolds, Charlottetown, 40 bbls oysters; Julia A, Penny, Charlottetown, 25 bbls oysters; Ada Louise, Emer, Hawkesbury, 700 bushels potatoes and 200 bushels turnips; Hector, Wilter, Hawkesbury, 1,500 bushels potatoes, 120 bushels turnips, 50 bushels oats, 1 hog, 12 doz-n cabbage; Hydra, Bontreau, Glac-Bav, 1,500 bushels potatoes, 1,000 bushels oats; Farquin, Garoum, ballast; sloop Willie Cook, Roberts, Pictou, 25 bbl oysters; Orwell Dairying Company shipped 144,712 lbs cheese; steamer Jacques Cartier, McLean, Charlottetown, 45 bbls oysters.

Total value of potatoes shipped, \$850; oysters, \$1,200; oats, \$315; turnips, \$50 cheese, about \$12,300. Schr Tarquin is frozen in opposite China Point wharf. A detailed statement of the merchandise shipped to and fro per steamer Jacques Cartier will be given in a future issue.

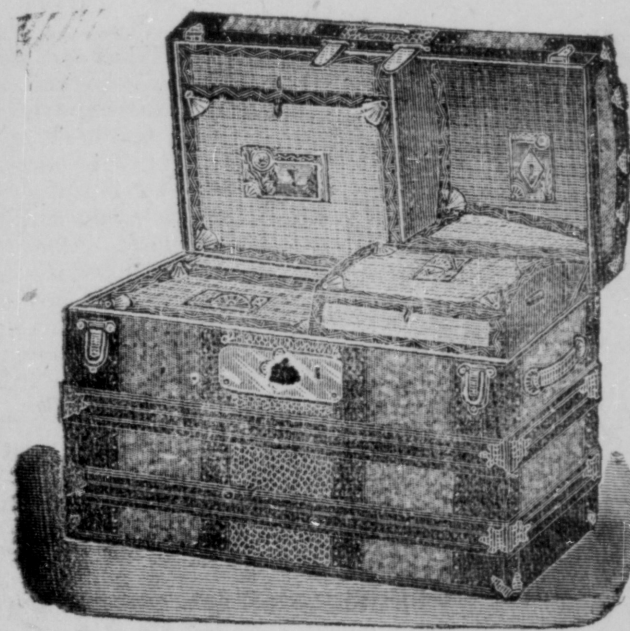
