## Technicolor Peace at UN's Headquarters

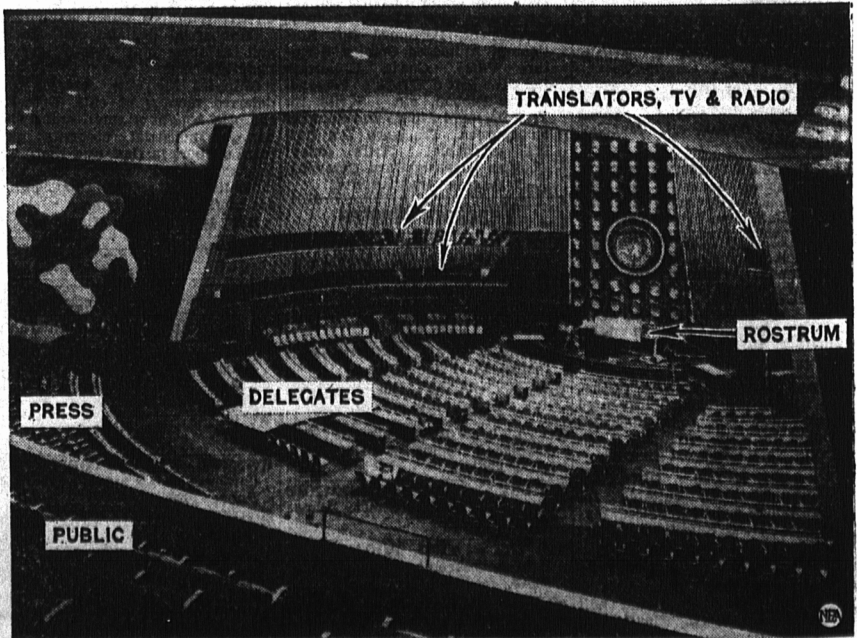
New General Assembly Hall Has the Impact of a Surrealistic Sunset

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — (NEA)—A little man in a gray suit stood at one side of the rostrum and spoke into a microphone. "This is a test of the public address system of the United Nations General Assembly hall," he said with an Oxford accent. Nobody paid much attention. Up in the balcony a man in overalls was busy running a vacuum cleaner, and on the main floor somebody else was distributing headphonses sets among the chairs, dealing them off his arm like a waiter setting tables. Today, if you plugged in one of the earphones and listened, you could flick a switch and hear, in any one of seven languages, the deliberations of the seventh session of the UN General Assembly, meeting for the first time in its permanent headquarters on the banks of New York's East River.

On this day you would have heard the rattle of the gray suit only on channel one, which is for English. The translators were not in their booths, and as yet there was no Russian harangue to disturb the carpeted hush of this brand new \$12,250,000 meeting place of the world. Since the harangues of the seventh General Assembly began this month, the news cameras and TV eyes have focused on the hall's vaulted interior. But the way to really see it is when it's empty. Then, without the distraction of Very Important People and their deliberations and debates, it has the impact of a surrealistic sunset. Then it is like walking into the fanciest of movie palaces before the show begins—and this new hall would make the fanciest of movie palaces look shabby.

The carpeting (from France) which covers the floor is forest green, and the 10 rows of delegates' desks (750 seats, room enough for 72 delegations) are covered with leather in a lighter shade of green. Blonde wood from Sweden frames the desks and the chairs. And when you peer down from the balcony at this pattern of desks and chairs on an empty

day, without the dark-suited figures of delegates to break up the vista, you get the feeling that a pale October sky has suddenly fallen into an angry green sea, for the chairs are upholstered in sort of a robin's egg blue. In a half-circle fronting the delegates' area, fluted wooden strips, painted gold, rise 75 feet to the central dome, broken by two tiers of glass-enclosed booths for TV, radio, and translators. Your guide will tell you the architects felt the wood strips gave an organ-like effect. To an irreverent reporter, it looked more like the bamboo curtain. Right behind the rostrum, surrounding the UN emblem, are six rows of circular shields, three feet
