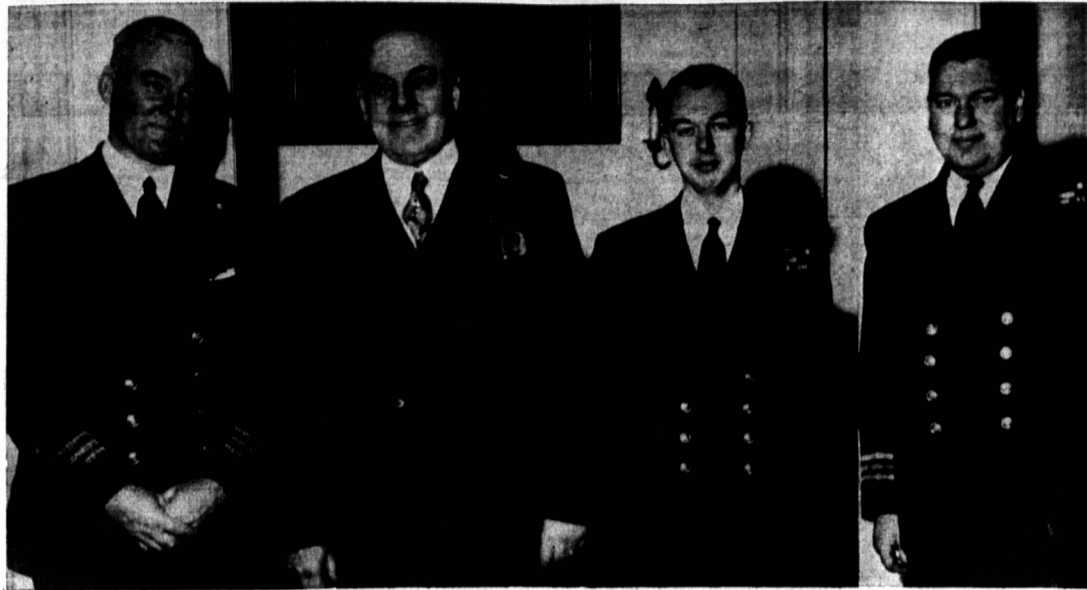

## Five Drowned When Truck Goes Through Lake Ice

KENORA Ont. (CP) — Police were attempting Sunday to recover the bodies of five men drowned Saturday when a truck carrying 16 Hydro construction workers plunged through the ice on a lake crossing 20 miles north of here. The eleven other men, all members of an Ontario Hydro Commission construction crew erecting towers for a transmission line between a power project at White dog Falls and Kenora, 40 miles to the south, escaped.

## Most Ministers Retain Positions

LONDON (CP) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today reappointed Selwyn Lloyd, an architect of the Suez intervention, as foreign secretary in a new cabinet with an old look. Macmillan called on most key ministers to stay in the posts they held when he succeeded Sir Anthony Eden last Thursday. Only four ministers in the Eden cabinet were dropped.

## Bevan Hits At Eisenhower Plan

LONDON (Reuters) — Aneurin Bevan Sunday attacked the Eisenhower Middle East doctrine as "calculated to plunge the world into the nightmare of final war." Writing in the left-wing Sunday newspaper Reynolds's News, Bevan charged that the president's plan will undermine the authority of the United Nations.

Fears are expressed here privately that the United States now is pursuing the former British policy of driving a wedge between President Nasser's government and its Arab allies.

Meanwhile attempts were made to refloat the Newfoundland motor vessel Marilyn Clair which ran aground in near-by Mira Bay Friday during a gale.

LIMESTONE, Me. (AP)—Searchers Sunday found the body of the eighth and final victim of an explosion which sent a B-52 jet bomber to the ground in flaming wreckage near Andover, N.H., last Thursday.

## Sees Dangers Democracies In Asia May Go "Authoritarian"

OTTAWA (CP) — Health Minister Martin says unless democratic Asian countries are "understood" by the West, there is a danger of them attempting "authoritarian short-cuts on the road to modernization." Mr. Martin, who is in Asia on a tour, said that the Commonwealth "is a mighty instrument for peace, not only in Asia but all over the world."

## 35 Below In Parts Of N. B.

CAMPBELLTON (CP)—A spell of frigid weather hit the northern sections of New Brunswick over the weekend with readings varying from zero to 35 degrees below. Campbellton was the coldest town with temperatures on Saturday reported at 28 below and going down to as low as 35 in some areas of the country.

## Observers Believe Pearson Is Being Groomed For Leadership

OTTAWA (CP) — Political observers in the Capital are speculating that Prime Minister St. Laurent has started a move to groom External Affairs Minister Pearson for the Liberal leadership. These sources believe that if Mr. St. Laurent ever had planned to promote Finance Minister Harris it isn't his thought now. And they don't believe that Mr. Harris at the moment is thinking in terms of the party leadership.

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Secretary Dulles has warned Congress that Soviet Communism is likely to gain bloodless domination over Western Europe unless the United States sends aid to the Middle East.

## Dulles Issues Warning

Washington (AP) — State Secretary Dulles has warned Congress that Soviet Communism is likely to gain bloodless domination over Western Europe unless the United States sends aid to the Middle East. Dulles, in testimony made public Saturday night, said that unless the United States acts fast to maintain independence and to preserve their historical traditions through democratic procedures. But, he said, there are enormous physical problems to be overcome.

## Russia Warns U.S. President

MOSCOW (AP)—Russia warned President Eisenhower Saturday that his Middle East program can lead to dangerous consequences "the full responsibility for which will rest with the U. S. government." A 3,000-word official Soviet denunciation of the Eisenhower Doctrine said the president's message to Congress "rings with the voice of war, not the voice of peace."

## New Disorders In Hungary As Government Stiffens Penalties

BUDAPEST (Reuters)—Sweeping changes in Hungary's martial law making almost any new anti-state activity punishable by death came into force throughout the country Sunday. A decree enacted by the Soviet-backed government gave new powers to summary courts set up in December to try "counter-revolutionary activities."

## Two Highway Fatalities In N. B.

FREDERICTON (CP)—A truck collision at Marysville Friday night took the life of Arm Joseph Godin, 26, of Ste. A. Du Bocage, Gloucester County. Two other car passengers, Harold Hachey and Lorenzo Arault, both 27 and of Inverness, fared almost identical fracturing of the pelvis and hands. An Inj will be held following their return from hospital in about two weeks.

## AIR BASES FOR NATO

BONN (Reuters)—West Germany has agreed to build 25 bases for North Atlantic forces in addition to the 19 ready in use here, the defence ministry announced.
