S'ide Man Is Admitted To Bar Of P.E. Island

Mr. Neil R. MacLeod of Summerside was admitted to the Bar of P.E.I. as a barrister and attorney at an imposing ceremony yesterday in the Supreme Court, Summerside, with His Honor Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy presiding.

After the motion for Mr. MacLeod's admittance, made by Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., was granted Judge Tweedy said, "I wish to congratulate you very sincerely upon your being admitted as an attorney at law and being called to the Bar of the Province of Prince Edward Island. I have examined your scholastic record here and at Dalhousie University. Mr. MacLeod is a very capable and honourable and satisfactory one. I have also followed your movements since you became articled in Mr. Stewart's office. If you apply yourself to the actual practice of law as you have to the study of its theory, I know your efforts will be crowned with success. This name MacLeod has long been associated with the practice of law in Prince Edward Island. At least two firms are recalled at this time — the firm of MacLeod and Bentley, and the firm of MacLeod, Morson and MacQuarrie — my predecessors in the practice of law. See to it that you guard well the high standard set by the MacLeods. Your relatives and friends have every reason to be proud of you and to expect much from you.

He then pointed out three guide posts for Mr. MacLeod to follow: (1) Always remember that "The law is a very jealous mistress; by that I mean, devote all your time to the practice and study of the law, if you do this you are bound to succeed and will need no side lines to help you maintain your standard of living."

(2) Pay strict attention to the canons of legal ethics which were approved by the Canadian Bar Association. By these it is pointed out that the lawyer is more than a mere citizen. He is a minister of justice, an advocate of the courts, his clients' officer, and a member of an ancient, honourable and learned profession.

In these several capacities it is your duty to promote the interests of the state, serve the cause of justice, maintain the authority and dignity of the courts, be faithful to your clients, candid and courteous with your fellows, and true to yourself.

(3) And, finally, be prepared and willing to go the second mile for your clients and your profession. By that I mean be willing to put yourself out for your client. After all, if a client has a problem, to him it is the most vital and important thing in the world. If he calls on you, therefore, to assist him, do so, even at the sacrifice of your own time and energy," said Mr. Tweedy.

Supreme Court At Summerside

The only case on the docket at the final sitting of the fall term of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday was that of an appeal by Mr. George Warren of Albany against a sentence imposed on September 12, 1955, after he pleaded guilty to making a false statement in an application for a farm improvement loan.

Judgment was by the fine and punishment be confirmed, except that costs be reduced from \$65.25 to \$5.75, or three months in jail. Also that a penalty be imposed of \$1230.00, being the amount of the farm improvement loan not repaid by the accused. In the original statement this amount was to be paid in thirty days, whereas the defendant now has an indefinite period in which to pay.

Mr. W. Chester S. Macdonald was the attorney for the accused.

Junior Farmers President Reports Active 1st Year

In his report as president of the organization, Mr. Urban Laughlin, at the first annual meeting of the East Prince Junior Farmers, reviewed the activities and accomplishments of both the 4-H Clubs and the Junior Farmers groups in the Province during the past year.

He told the Summerside meeting that the Junior Farmers groups of P.E.I. had spent much time towards promoting 4-H Club work. He said they did this because they realized that rural youth must be trained young to work and plan with others and by so doing, cultivate an interest in affairs around them. Junior Farmers' groups encourage 4-H Clubs in the hope that senior and graduating 4-H members will become Junior Farmers' members. "We discovered," he said, "that our most interested Junior Farmers are in many cases senior or ex 4-H Club members."

LEARN BY DOING

Rural boys and girls between 10 and 21 years of age, eligible to join a 4-H Club, whose motto is "Learn by doing".

These clubs help rural youth to solve their problems and understand the responsibilities of citizenship. The 4-H's stand for Head, Heart, Hands and Health. The objectives are to train the head to think, the heart to be loyal, the hands to be helpful and to promote health for better living for their club, community and country.

The 4-H program asks each member to raise, manage or complete one project each year. This project is centered at the member's home and keeps the youth's interest there.

Four-H members are trained to conduct meetings properly, thus enabling them to be of practical service to society on many occasions, said Mr. Laughlin.

RECORD MEMBERSHIP

Along with more widespread public interest, membership in 4-H Club work is increasing steadily and this year established a new record in Canada of 72,794 enrollment in 4,852 clubs. This is an increase of 4,071 members and 164 clubs over 1954.

When rural young men and women are between 16 and 30 years of age, they are eligible to become Junior Farmers' Members. The aims of Junior Farmers' organizations are: to improve the social, educational and recreational standards of rural life. There are many projects in which Junior Farmers may take part to realize these aims such as debating, public speaking, short courses, fairs, organized tours, essay contests, etc.

EXERCISE TOPCOAT

Many Junior Farmers took part in the ground observer exercise "Topcoat" which was held in October. About half of the membership had the experience of reporting various aircraft to the filter centre at Truro, N. A.

Mr. Laughlin said that during the year he was a member of the Provincial Junior Farmers delegation that waited on the Premier and more recently on the Minister of Agriculture. With the Minister they discussed the purchasing of Junior Farmers crests, the possibility of obtaining the services of a part-time fieldman for Junior farmers, etc., and suggested a 4-H leaders banquet to be held to express appreciation to the active club leaders for valuable service rendered during the year.

SCHOLARSHIPS

On November 23rd this banquet was held at the Charlottetown Hotel.

The East Prince Junior Farmers organization is made up of rural men and women between 16 and 30 years within a 15-mile radius of Summerside, and during the year the group held 14 meetings and two picnics. Two special events heard by the club were Nuffield Scholarship winners; William Cairns who won the award in 1953, and Archie Johnston in 1954.
