favorable to the Liberals, indeed he seconded a resolution condemning that body. In April last Mr. Pinard, as convenor for his district, called several meetings of the Liberal-Conservative. The notices were signed by him. He was even at that late date a Liberal-Conservative. Yet we now find that gentleman sitting in this House and supporting the very men he was a few months ago chosen to oppose, and although he was a short time ago a Liberal-Conservative. It was not true, as stated, that either the Liberal-Conservatives or the Star newspaper had said that the French-Canadians were disloyal, and he defied his opponents to prove their statements. Mr. Peters stated that the Conservative party and every member of it from Sir Charles down denounced the disloyalty of the French-Canadians. But when put to the test no utterance of Sir Charles or statement of the Conservative press was produced to substantiate the charges. Mr. McLean read from Sir Charles's speech at Quebec as follows:

"No power on earth outside of our own Parliament shall have the right to levy a dollar of taxation on the people of Canada. There are no more loyal people under the sun than are to be found within the bounds of the British Empire. I will say there is no portion of the Empire that is more deeply and devotedly attached to the Sovereign than Canada. I say further that there is no portion of Canada that has shown since the time that this country passed into the hands of the British, down to the present moment, that it is more prepared to uphold British interests with its blood and with its treasure than this great Province of Quebec. What has been done by us hitherto for the Empire has been the spontaneous act of the people of Canada. It is for us to judge when the necessity and the occasion demand that we should come to the front. We have shown to the world that it requires no pressure upon the people to secure expression to their loyal devotion to the throne and Sovereign. What is the reason that the name of Canada is in the mouth of England to-day, that the world is ringing with the praises of what Canadians have done? It is because the act has been spontaneous, not from any arrangement or pledge that has been forced upon us in another quarter of the world."

It is a matter of history that the Liberals did not send the contingent until they were forced by the Conservatives and the people to do so. Taking up the charges preferred against the Opposition by the Leader in connection with the wise matter, Mr. McLean repudiated them and charged that the Leader had acted in accordance with the conditions accompanying Mr. Wise's resignation.

The Leader said the resignation was unconditional and voluntary. The Speaker said he never heard of any conditions, and most certainly did not get them.

Mr. McLean said Mr. Wise stated that certain conditions did exist and that they were in Mr. Fitzgibbon's handwriting, and that gentleman's word was as good as that of the Premier. It was also stated that the writ of election had been signed but it has been withheld.

THE RELIEF OF MAPEKING

Right Royally Celebrated in Charlottetown.

There was great rejoicing in Charlottetown, last night, over the relief of Mapeking, the town which Colonel Baden Powell has so gallantly defended for about seven months. The news reached Charlottetown about 6 o'clock, and the bulletin board in front of THE EXAMINER office contained the first information of the relief. Then the blowing of steam whistles and ringing of bells proclaimed the glad tidings.

Streamers of flags were thrown across the streets and from the store windows they also fluttered to the breeze. Flags were carried about the streets by jubilant citizens, and everywhere the red, white and blue was in evidence. The decorations of the stores were also of a patriotic character, and many of the show windows were really beautiful. The entire front of Weeks & Co's store was filled with flags and bunting, and they had a string of flags across Queen Street. Prowse Bros store was also handsomely decorated, and the strings of flags flying across Queen and Richmond Streets were put up by this enterprising firm.

From many of the stores fireworks were set off, and the small boy and girl with their cracker attachment were also most conspicuous.

The booming of the cannon on the top of Dadd & Rogers building was a prominent feature of the celebration; and the bonfire on Market Square lent a picturesque touch to the scene.

The military parade, though hastily organized, speaks well for the officers and men. As many as possible assembled at the drill shed, and by 9 o'clock everything was ready for the march. Headed by the Artillery Band, the militia, under the command of Captain Goodwill, and composed of companies No. 1 and 2, 4th Regiment, C. A., Engineers and No. 3 Company, 82nd Battalion, marched to Fort Edward where a salute of seventeen guns was fired by detachments from the Artillery companies under command of Capt. Bartlett and sub-commanded by Lieut. Peake and Lieut. Leigh. Three cheers were given for the Queen and three for Col. Baden-Powell.

Coming back to the city the procession marched through the principal streets and returned to the drill shed. Along the line of march, which was brilliantly illuminated, immense crowds were gathered and every demonstration of joy was made.

This outburst of patriotic joy was totally unlooked for, and the citizens of Charlottetown may take some true pride in themselves.

The good news was also received with manifestations of joy in other sections of the province. Flags were up wherever there was one to be found. In Summerside the Boys Brigade marched through the streets and joy bells pealed.
