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Juveniles Held
In S'side Truck
Theft Case

Two juveniles were taken into
custody by Summerside police on
Saturday night charged with tak-
ing a half-ton truck and they may
also be charged with two car
thefts the previous night.

The truck, a new 1951 Dodge, be-
longing to Mr. Willard MacDonald,
Dodge dealer, had been stolen
from outside the old curling rink
which Mr. MacDonald is using
for car storage purposes.

The theft was discovered about
eight o'clock and police were im-
mediately notified and sent out
an alarm to the R.C.M.P. and the
R.C.A.F. service police. About 9:30
a call was received at the police
station from the guard house at
the airport that the truck had
arrived there and they were
holding two persons.

The same boys are alleged to
have been implicated in a joy
riding escapade the night before.
Then employees of A. Horne and
Co. Ltd. came to work Saturday
morning they saw that the door
of a storage garage on First
Street had been forced open and
about the same time they noticed
that two cars which should have
been inside were on the parking
lot adjacent.

Australian Mission
To Quit China

SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 12 —
(Reuters)—An Australian official
of the China Inland Mission an-
nounced Saturday that the mis-
sionary withdrew all its 600 mis-
sionaries from China as soon as pos-
sible.

The mission's New South Wales
secretary, G. P. Moore, said there
was no direct persecution of mis-
sionaries but they were not
wanted and their presence made
difficulties for Chinese Christians.
"Any Chinese who has any-
thing to do with us is branded
as an imperialist spy," he said.

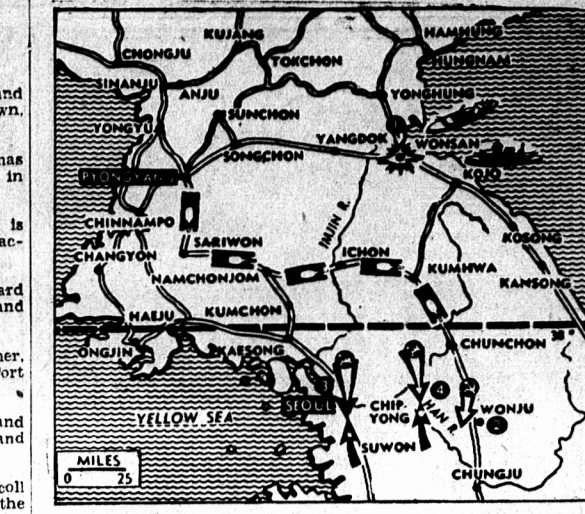
