Indian Girl Baton-Tweeler Chosen For Goodwill Tour

By WALTER KREVENCHUK WINNIPEG (CP) - Baton-twirling has brought exciting changes to the world of Marlene Jackson.

It is taking the 19-year-old Indian girl to England, Belgium, The Netherlands, Denmark, Sweden and Norway. Marlene, a native of Saskatchewan who grew up in Edmonton, is one of 22 Canadians chosen for the third biennial goodwill tour of Europe by a select 70-piece band and 60-voice choir from the International Music Camp. They'll be abroad July 17 to Aug. 24.

Miss Jackson says she didn't expect to be selected as the group's featured baton-twirler but it's not really a surprise to others. Her dexterity with the baton has brought her Western Canada, Alberta and Manitoba baton-twirling championships. And her 36-26-36 figure distributed nicely over five feet, five inches of height didn't hurt a bit.

"I used to practise four hours a day, every day except Sunday," says Marlene, a clerk-typist student at the Manitoba Institute of Technology.

Miss Jackson, who took part in the Miss Majorette of Canada contest at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto last summer, goes to Europe with the title of Indian Princess of Manitoba. She was crowned June 20.

APPEARED IN PAGEANT During an appearance in the North American Indian Pageant in Bismarck, N.D., last year, Marlene met Sister Ione of Annunciation Priory. She wrote a letter to Merton Uigaard, director of the International Music Camp, and he invited Miss Jackson to go to Europe.

Women's Secondary Position Is Because Of Prejudice

MONTREAL (CP) - Many of Canada's laws will remain outmoded until women obtain legislative power, Mrs. M. J. Sabia, president of the Canadian Federation of University Women, said Tuesday.

Mrs. Sabia, an alderman for the city of St. Catharines, Ont., was addressing some 300 delegates to the Canadian Home Economics Association meeting here.

Women should not be relegated to patrolling the biological beat of bed, board and babies, she said. "Society cannot afford the loss of segregation of half its potential from its intellectual, professional and industrial life."

Mrs. Sabia said women themselves are largely to blame for their subordinate position. They must assume the responsibilities that go hand-in-hand with their rights.

As legislators, women would not permit such laws as the one currently governing domicile to remain in force. This law, says a woman's
