DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

An Interesting Debate.

The Recent Consultations at Washington.

OTTAWA, April 29. The modus vivendi bill was read a third time and passed, also the Steamboat Inspection Act.

On motion to go into supply, Mr. Laurier moved an amendment censuring the Government for forwarding to England a formal report of the recent reciprocity conference at Washington, without submitting such a report to the Canadian Parliament.

He said the matter was one involving the constitutional rights of the people's representatives. The Ministers had treated Parliament with contempt. The constitutional rule required that all papers relating to negotiations with foreign countries should be laid before Parliament.

Sir John Thompson showed that there was no infringement of the British practice in the case. The interview in question was to be informal and unofficial, and the Leader of the Opposition was wrong in refusing the title of "Commissioner" to those engaged in that conference. It was impossible to reduce to writing what did take place at an informal conference which was not concluded. The Leader of the Opposition says that we were at fault in communicating what did take place to the British Parliament before laying the same before the Canadian Parliament. An informal conference having taken place in the presence of the British minister, it was our first duty to represent what did take place to Her Majesty's Government. Her Majesty's Government did not stand in the same relation to Canada and foreign governments. All documents relating to what was discussed and completed were laid before Parliament. With regard to other matters, there was no result and no communication, and consequently the proceedings could not be reduced to writing and laid before Parliament.

Mr. L. H. Davies asked how Parliament and the country could form a judgment upon the proposals made by the government at Washington, and that the accuracy of Mr. Fisher's statements as to what took place at the official reports were laid before the House. The ministers were, he said, surprising information to which the country was entitled.

Hon. Mr. Tupper said that Mr. Blaine and Sir Richard Cartwright had exactly the same opinion about Unrestricted Reciprocity and that was as put by the letter, to tax all the goods or other articles except those of the United States. He said that the member for Queen's, P. E. Island, would search the Washington Treaty, 1858, in vain to find that the consultations and conversations which had taken place were published.

After others had spoken the amendment was lost in a vote of 57 to 98. Majority 41.

Deeming Confesses.

LONDON, April 29. The Melbourne Standard announces without reserve that Deeming has confessed to his lawyers and the doctors who examined him that he committed a majority of the Jack the Ripper murders in Whitechapel.

The Redistribution Bill.

OTTAWA, April 29. It has been finally decided that the redistribution bill as applicable to Nova Scotia will contain a provision uniting the counties of Queen's and Shelburne.

Parliamentary Rifle Association.

OTTAWA, April 29. The parliamentary rifle association has been formed. Kullback was elected Vice President for Nova Scotia; Hazen for New Brunswick, and McLean for P. E. Island.

Fire in New York.

NEW YORK, April 29. A fire broke out in a house at West 32nd Street yesterday. Ten persons were burned to death and others severely injured.

Licensing Insurance Agents.

OTTAWA, April 29. White's bill for the licensing of insurance agents and for prohibiting rebates on insurance premiums was thrown out by the commerce committee.
