THE British Registrar-General in a recent return says: The unrevived number of the population of registration in London, recently enumerated, is 3,814,571, and shows an increase of 500,311, or 17.2 per cent. upon the number enumerated in 1871; the increase in the preceding ten years was 450,271, or 16.1 per cent.

THE will of the late Mrs. S. N. Binney, of Halifax, has been filed in probate. She left \$1,000 each to the Sackville Educational Endowment Fund and to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and Wesleyan Missionary Society; \$2,000 are distributed amongst various local charities and the balance goes to relatives.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. London, June 16.

Sir John A. Macdonald, Canadian Premier, had an interview with Cardinal Manning in regard to emigration and the question of educational facilities in Canada.

The Ascot race for the St. James' Palace stakes, about a mile, was won by Lorillard's Iroquois, who beat Lagrange's Leon. Only two ran. In the betting Iroquois was the favorite 3 to 1.

In the race for the St. James' Palace stakes, at Ascot, Iroquois won by half a length.

LIVERPOOL, June 16.

The Mayor received a letter from Sir John Macarthur, Home Secretary, stating that the Treasury Solicitor will probably not be ready for the case of McKeivitt and McGrath on Saturday. Therefore the prisoners will probably be remanded. A book containing the names and addresses of several Fenian accomplices has been found on Roberts alias McGrath.

UNITED STATES.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., June 16.

The U. S. Malsters' Association are holding their annual convention here. J. B. Manning was elected president. He made an address showing the necessity of legislative action to protect their interests against the Canadian Malsters, who were enabled by United States laws to undersell Americans. A resolution was adopted of sympathy with the New York Brewers against the strikers. A committee of twenty-two was appointed with headquarters in New York to protect the interests of Malsters. Adjourned sine die.

NEW YORK, June 16.

Henry Mason, veteran Hell Gate pilot, was fatally injured last night by being thrown from a small boat under the wheel of a passing steamer.

Twelve emigrants on the steamship Wisconsin, which arrived last night, were taken to the hospital with small pox. The ship was fumigated and the 660 emigrants kept on board until to-day. The cabin passengers were allowed to land last night.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 16.

The repairs to the break in the Erie Canal, two miles west of this place, are completed. Navigation will be resumed to-day.
