

# Habs Blast Rangers 7-2; Leafs-Chicago Draw 1-1

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens spotted New York Rangers two goals Saturday night and then romped to a 7-2 win that jolted the second-place aspirations of the New Yorkers.

The issue went over to the Sunday night game of the National Hockey League schedule. Detroit Red Wings, with a two-point margin over Rangers, were at home to Toronto Leafs while Rangers and the league champion Canadiens met at New York.

Bernie Borovick, Montreal's "Canadiens" scoring spurge with two goals. Singles were scored by Jean Beliveau—his 46th of the season — Doug Harvey, Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard, Floyd Curry and Bert O'Keefe.

**TOO MUCH POWER**

Rookie Andy Hebenton and Larry Popenin scored for Rangers before half-way mark in the first period. From there on, Montreal

had too much power and outshot the Rangers 44-27 for the full game.

The crowd of 13,648 saw a wide-open, spirited game that produced 15 minor penalties on the anniversary of the Forum riot. One year ago the Detroit-Montreal game ended in a forfeiture to the Red Wings.

TORONTO (CP) — Defenceman Gus Morrison scored on a 40-foot blast in the third period Saturday night to give Chicago Black Hawks a 1-1 National Hockey League tie against Toronto Maple Leafs before 15,333 fans.

The deadlock moved Leafs into a fourth-place tie with Boston Bruins and set the stage for a tense final-night battle in their race for a Stanley cup playoff berth.

Bruins, idle Saturday, met Hawks Sunday night. Leafs took on Detroit Red Wings in the windup of the regular 70-game schedule. The tie meant nothing to the last-place Hawks, out of the playoff running long ago.

Lefwinger Dick Duff, outstanding rookie left winger fired the Toronto goal at 13:27 of the second period. It appeared as though it would be the winner until Morrison, cast off by Leafs after the 1951-52 campaign, unleashed a screened shot at 9:12 of the third period that hit the upper right-hand corner of the net.

Leafs closed out their home appearances in the regular season with a record of 23 wins, 33 losses and 13 ties for 59 points. Before Sunday night's games, Bruins had the same number of wins, ties and setbacks as Toronto.

The game was hitting a ragged—sometimes sloppy—pace when Duff picked up a pass from centre Tod Sloan near the Chicago cage and flipped the puck behind netminder Al Rollins.

# Nashua Sent To Defeat

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Nashua went down to the most crushing defeat of his brilliant career Saturday in the \$112,000 Gulfstream Park handicap, a 1 1/4-mile race won by Brookmeade stable's Sailor.

A crowd of 32,532 made Nashua the favorite at 3 to 5 in the field of seven but the top weight of 129 pounds apparently was too much for the big bay colt, who never threatened the leaders and finished a badly-beaten fifth.

Sailor, ridden by Willie Hartack, who was leading U.S. jockey with 417 winners last year, wrestled the lead from Alfred G. Vanderbilt's Find as they passed the stands the first time and never lost it.

Melleux, winner of the Appleton handicap last Saturday, was second, 1 1/4 lengths behind. Find finished another length back in third and Wide Margin ran fourth.

Nashua, shooting for the world's money-winning record held by Citation at \$1,085,760, spotted his seven opponents from four to 19 pounds. His fifth place finish was worth \$2,500 and brought his total winnings to \$1,040,515.

**EARNED \$83,300**

Sailor, fourth at Santa Anita last January and third to Nashua in the Hialeah last month, liked the fast Gulfstream Park racing strip and had plenty left at the finish, although he carried the same 119 pounds he had packed in the Widener.

Sailor, four-year-old chestnut colt by Eight Thirty out of Flota, ran the mile and one quarter in 2:00 3/5. He earned \$83,300.

In the betting, he was second choice at 7 to 2 and paid \$9.30, \$4.40 and \$3.90. Melleux returned \$9.40 and \$4.90 and Find \$5.90.

Eddie Arcaro, Nashua's jockey, said "it wasn't bad luck or anything like that that beat us. The only bad luck we had was just in not winning the race."

"That 129 pounds weight didn't do him any good. You start giving away weight like that and you are going to get whipped—it's got to happen some time."
