

Two Famous Regiments To Mark Anniversary

OTTAWA (CP)—Two of Canada's most famous infantry regiments—the Royal 22nd (Van Doo) and Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry—will mark the 50th anniversary of their founding at ceremonies here this week on separate days.

For the Royal 22nd, the celebrations will continue well into October, enabling the 2nd Battalion in Cyprus to get home from its United Nations chores in time to participate.

For the Patricias, the celebrations began in August and have been held in Germany and Edmonton with pilgrimages to Ypres, Belgium, and Cassino, Italy.

Both regiments will conduct ceremonies at the National War Memorial, the Royal 22nd on Wednesday, the Patricias on Saturday.

Governor-General Vanier, one of the founders of the Royal 22nd, is expected to take part in the war memorial ceremony with a 100-man guard of honor from the regiment. A wreath will be placed at the memorial in honor of members of the reg-

iment killed in the First and Second World Wars and the Korean War.

PARADE IN MONTREAL
On Friday the Royal 22nd will parade in Place Ville-Marie, Montreal, and on Saturday attend the unveiling of a monument at Saint-Jean, Que., to mark the founding of the unit there Oct. 21, 1914.

The regiment, plus men from each of its founding units, will attend an outdoor mass at Montreal Sunday and hold a parade.

Ceremonies at Quebec City will begin Oct. 7.

The Patricias haven't had a celebration here, their founding place, since they came back from the First World War in March, 1914.

The late Brig. A. Hamilton (Hammie) Gault of Montreal, the last man in the Commonwealth to be granted such permission, raised the PPCLI at his own expense and served with the regiment throughout the war. He was wounded three times and, like Gen. Vanier, lost a leg.

The regiment this year has created a scholarship fund in memory of Brig. Gault, who died in 1958, to help in the education of men from the ranks.

Mrs. Dorothy Gault, widow of the founder, will attend the ceremonies here next Friday and Saturday.

The Patricias take their name from Lady Patricia Ramsay, daughter of the Duke of Connaught, then governor-general.

She attended the regiment's Edmonton ceremonies this week.

About a dozen original members of the Patricias will attend the Ottawa ceremonies, which will include beating the retreat, a remembrance ceremony at the Peace Tower and a march past.

Dief's Cheques Not Cashed

BE'USHEBA, Israel (AP)—The 2-Join, long the lonely wanderer of the desert, is beginning to discover the 20th century.

For centuries the Bedouin has driven his sheep and goats across the vast desert reaches of the Middle East in search of water and grazing land.

Turkish Farmers Aided By Greek Police in Cyprus

TEMBLOS, Cyprus (CP)—"This is an historic occasion," said Maj. Bob Theriault, as Greek and Turkish Cypriots embraced outside the troubled village of Temblos, Cyprus, each other on the back. "Perhaps we should record it with a picture."

But when the photograph was agreed upon, nearly an hour later, the Canadian negotiator responsible for the reunion stepped quietly out of camera range.

The incident took place late in August when a dozen Turkish-Cypriot harvesters, mostly women and old men, ventured cautiously from their hemmed-in village under Canadian escort to gather the fruit of their gnarled carob trees.

An elderly Turkish-Cypriot recognized a constable in the group of Greek-Cypriot policemen who met them at the grove, and a round of hand-shaking and back-hugging began.

It was something of a triumph for Maj. Theriault, 36, a six-foot Quebecer with a military mustache who commands B Company of the 1st Battalion, Royal 22nd Regiment.

Weeks of patient negotiation and persuasion had laid the groundwork for the harvesting operation, weeks of going back and forth between Greek-Cypriot authorities and the Turkish-Cypriot mukhtar—village headman—of Temblos, calming fears and suspicions.

Sullivan Mining Group Aims At Program In Bathurst Area

MONTREAL (CP)—The Sullivan mining group has announced it is initiating a \$10,000,000 exploration program at the property of Nigadoo River Mines Ltd. of Bathurst, N.B.

The group recently bought 79 per cent of the 2,000,000 issued shares of Nigadoo River, formerly Nigadoo Mines Ltd., for a \$100,000 subscription to the company's treasury and the buying up to \$918,000 worth of notes at a discount.

The site is a lead-silver-zinc-cadmium property which by underground workings had already been shown to contain approximately 1,500,000 million tons of ore with "high silver and cadmium content."

The company said the money spent on exploration would be used to pump out the old property, repair the shaft, buy equipment and conduct surface exploration.

Dr. King Talks With Pope Paul

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Dr. Martin Luther King talked for 25 minutes Friday with Pope Paul VI in an interview after the Catholic pontiff promised to make a personal and public denunciation of racial segregation.

The American civil rights leader, called his meeting with the Pope and the Pontiff's words "profound encouragement for all Christians in the world and particularly in the United States who are involved in the civil rights struggle with us."

King, 35, a Negro Baptist minister, and the Pontiff conferred in the papal apartment of the Apostolic Palace.
