It is pleasing to note that Prime Minister Pearson will be able to enjoy at least a few hours of rest and seclusion at the North Shore, following his arrival here tomorrow.

Dangerous Situation

The resignation of South Vietnam's ambassador at Washington in protest against his own government's policy in dealing with militant Buddhist opposition leaders is an extraordinary incident, adding point to the strong criticism which the U.S. state department has been making in this regard.

It is no longer certain that the Buddhist rebellion is primarily religious in nature. It may now have political objectives, such as the overthrow of the regime of President Diem, which is overwhelmingly Catholic although the population of South Vietnam is over two-thirds Buddhist.

The rebellion is fast assuming a popular aspect, and it is feared that if Diem becomes locked in a second civil war with his own people, he may lose the original civil war in which a Communist guerrilla movement failed to gain power.

There is another aspect to the problem from Washington's standpoint. With 12,000 American military personnel in the country, it cannot fail to become involved in this internal struggle. Nor can it afford to be labelled as anti-Buddhist.

Real Problem Faces Couple

By Dr. Theodore R. Van Dellen: My wife has an obsessive hypochondria that is making her nervous and shaky. She is becoming more irritable and complains of palpitation.

Pregnancy complicates the hypochondria picture because the unborn child must be taken into consideration. The three drugs employed most frequently in the medical treatment of this disease are propylthiouracil, tapazole, and Itrium.

The use of radioactive iodine (I131) is an excellent remedy for overactive thyroid gland in women under 30 years of age because of the chance that it might make permanent sterility.

Removal of the gland has an adverse effect on development of the baby's thyroid unless the mother takes desiccated thyroid or thyroxin daily throughout pregnancy.

Diem's Tough Approach

For 15 weeks the Buddhist crisis of South Viet Nam has built up in a steady, bitter crescendo.

From one side he has been under pressure to conciliate to grant the Buddhist demands for religious and social equality.

The pressures for conciliation have been immense: from the United States, which is pouring an estimated \$100,000,000 or more a day into Diem's anti-Communist war.

On the other side, advocating the tough way, was the president's family clique, notably Mrs. Ngo Dinh Nhu, the petite and powerful wife of his younger brother.
