Mother Braves Storm To Get Baby To Hospital

O'LEARY — A young woman walked a mile and a half through heavy snow drifts to reach hospital with a fluttering baby as yesterday's storm brought highway traffic to a standstill in the western part of the island.

The young woman carried her two-year-old daughter through heavy snow drifts from Inverness to Portage, where she boarded the train yesterday morning for O'Leary and took the baby to hospital.

A car, owned by Dr. Andre LeCris, O'Leary, was involved in a head-on collision with a half-ton truck driven by Albert MacMillan of West Cape. The accident occurred in a narrow cutting at Springfield and a snowplow had to be used to pull the vehicles apart and remove them from the cutting. No one was injured in the accident.

Doctors had difficulty answering emergency calls yesterday as snow plows found it difficult to keep in the cuttings. One doctor got lost while walking from the road to a house and only found his way again by following a line fence.

W. Prince Has Power Failure During Storm

ALBERTON — Good Friday will long be remembered by many in Western Prince County as a day without power, lights and in many cases heat, in the wake of one of the nastiest storms of the winter.

All highways were blocked Thursday and Friday by snow and gale force winds and a 20-hour interruption of electric power left many homes without heating or cooking facilities.

The interruption of power occurred about 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon and continued until about 6 o'clock Friday afternoon except for a few hours early Friday morning.

Fortunately both the Western Hospital and O'Leary Community Hospital have their own emergency power systems. Also at Matthews' turkey farm, the Princess Pat Theatre, White Apartments and several private homes also have installed auxiliary systems in the last few years.

One of the worst features of the power break was the lack of information on when the power would be expected to resume. Up until Friday afternoon reports were that the trouble might not be repaired that day.

At the height of the gale Thursday afternoon a new chimney blew down at the home of Arthur MacTee in Alberton. The fire was built late last fall and the scaffolding was still in place when the top blew down.
