PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

P. E. Island Questions and Answers.

A Second Steamer Promised.

OTTAWA, March 15.—A run was made on the order paper in the House of Commons yesterday.

Mr. Martin was informed that the government did not propose to assume control of the Breakwater at Belle River, P. E. Island at present.

Mr. Yeo was informed that one lease of an oyster bed had been made at Malpeque in Shemody creek to Mr. Enmar, Mr. Kemp the inspector having reported that he did not consider it a live bed being in shallow water and liable to be killed by ice and frost. The government do not propose to allow oyster beds to become depleted. Mr. Kemp's salary is \$1500.

Mr. Martin was informed that the government are considering representations made by the member for West Prince respecting improvements in the winter communication between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland. It is contemplated to put on a second winter steamer, but the route has not been decided upon.

No representations have been made respecting freight and passenger rates, but these were reduced last year to the rates of the summer boats. The government is not aware that the terms of union define what the rates shall be.

Mr. Jameson's resolution in favor of a board of railway commissioners was debated at some length.

SALISBURY'S ILLNESS.

Balfour Takes His Place While He Rests in France.

LONDON, March 15.—Owing to his illness, Lord Salisbury has been advised to take a complete rest in the south of France, Hon. A. J. Balfour as far as necessary dealing with the Foreign Office business. The papers contain articles expressive of regret and concern.

SYMPATHY WITH SPAIN.

Germany and Austria Against the States.

LONDON, March 15.—The Vienna correspondent of the Standard declares that Austria and Germany sympathize with Spain against the United States.

GALT, March 14.—The most disastrous flood in years occurred here yesterday, and at other points along the Grand river. The ice jam at Blair gave way at half past seven yesterday morning and came rushing through town, sweeping everything before it. Three bridges were washed away, and several factories along the river side flooded. The Grand Trunk tracks along the river side are also washed out badly.

FRUIT FOR GREAT BRITAIN.

DEAR SIR,—I observe in the annual report of the Charlottetown Board of Trade some mention made by its able President, Mr. Horace Hazzard, on Fruit culture on your Island. Being one of the largest apple receivers here, landing consignments from your neighbors in Nova Scotia, a few remarks from me may prove of interest to your readers.

Apple growing is admitted by any Canadian grower to be his easiest money earner; if he can rely on obtaining for his crop an average net price of \$1 per bbl, although during season 1896-7 some three million bbls. were consigned to our markets from Canada and America, the most honest packers enjoyed returns exceeding \$1.50 per bbl. for their total exports. Careless packers, of course suffered. Good fruit can always be marketed here at satisfactory prices. Up to the present this season (which has nearly ended) only one sixth of 1896-7 season's quantity has arrived here and I have had the pleasure repeatedly of returning net proceeds of Kings, Ribston and Golden Russets to Nova Scotia shippers, amounting to \$6.50 per bbl.

As orchard planting is growing in your province a list hereunder mentioned of varieties most favored on the U. K. markets may be appropriate: i. e. Gravenstein, Emperor, Baldwin, Ben Davis, Blenheim, Greening, King Tomkin, Nonpariel, 20 day Pippin, Golden Russet, Pomme Gris, Spy, Fall-water and Gloria Mundi.

I am certain that apple raising by your farmers, would prove a very lucrative addition; it is certainly a very profitable industry if properly managed and I shall be most happy to give any of your readers any information they may wish, which I trust may advance their interest in this direction. I have the pleasure of knowing your Island, having visited it on two occasions and at present handle consignments of canned lobsters etc., and trust the date is not far distant when I may be favored with fruit consignments also.

Trusting your Board of Trade will continue to enjoy increased prosperity.

It is reported that: Mr. Oliver, the Liberal member for Alberta, is receiving the strong support of the Edmonton Board of Trade in the fight against the Government's Sticine route to the Yukon. A circular of the board points out the mistakes and infortunate circumstances connected with the Sifton scheme, and invites the support of the eastern public in preventing the ratification of a deal that, unless there is a tremendous extra expenditure incurred, in extending the railway southward to a Canadian port, will leave Canadian trade with the Yukon at the mercy of United States legislation, and United States customs officials. The Edmonton people want a real Canadian route—not a mock one—to the Yukon and so as the Montreal Gazette remarks do the vast majority of the Canadian people.

NEWS NOTES.

The number of patents issued at Ottawa last year was 4,013.

It is reported that the Ottawa and Montreal capitalists who some time ago bonded gold ores at Whyocoomagh, C. B., which are claimed to be proving immensely rich, will send Mr. Ogilvie, the famous Alaskan explorer, to Cape Breton to report on the mineral fields there. Dr. Gilpin, inspector of Nova Scotia mines, has sent to the Provincial Government a report on the result of his recent official trip to Whyocoomagh. He says the gold discoveries are very valuable, but does not go into minute details. A tunnel has been driven into a mountain where rich deposits exist. At the entrance to this the mines inspector encountered an armed man or guard and had considerable trouble in overcoming his objections to the inspector entering. Dr. Gilpin found very rich quartz near the entrance to this tunnel. He also found free gold in sand taken from the bed of the Whyocoomagh River.
