Battle Forest Fires in Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 14 - (CP) - United States troops and a coastal vessel played roles in combating five forest fires raging in various parts of Newfoundland.

A forest blaze which started today at Cuckhold's Cove, near St. John's, was fought by 70 United States army men from nearby Fort Pepperell.

The coastal vessel Northern Ranger arrived at Horse Island, off the Province's east coast, late yesterday to evacuate the Islanders as a forest fire threatened their homes. The fire was brought under control today, however, and the vessel continued on her coastal run.

The number of men fighting a blaze in scrub and second-growth timber near Winterland, on the southern Burin Peninsula, was increased to 100 today, and the fire which started a week ago continued to make slow headway three miles from the village.

Three forestry division pumping outfits were battling a stubborn fire in woods on Paradise Road, nine miles from the capital city. At a late hour tonight the fire was still out of control.

Another fire broke out in woodland at Old Perlican yesterday and the Forestry Protection Station at Whitbourne sent out a pumping unit, which is still retreating before the flames. Sunny weather did not help the fire fighters and rain was badly needed.

Chartered Accountants Prepare for Dominion Convention in Charlottetown

Chartered accountants from all parts of the Dominion will gather in Charlottetown on Monday, August 21, for their 46th annual meeting. This year, for the first time, representatives from Newfoundland will join their professional brothers from the other nine Provinces.

The Convention is to hear addresses by Hon. J. Walter Jones, Premier of Prince Edward Island, and Mr. J. Harold Stewart, C. P. A., President of the American Institute of Accountants, and a number of papers on professional matters will be read. Chief attention of this year's meeting will be directed to the problem of the individual in business and the small company, and to the municipal accounting and auditing.

Mr. Harvey D. Doane, C. A., of Halifax, President of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants, will preside.

Arrangements for the convention here are under the general chairmanship of Mr. R. W. Manning, associated with him are Messrs. R. M. Sears, W. Massey, T. E. Hickey, W. G. Thompson, P. A. Lawrence, J. W. Dixon and J. R. Leard.

At the Charlottetown The Convention sessions will be held for the most part at the Charlottetown Hotel. The two Thursday sessions, however, will take place in the Legion Hall, Grafton St.

It is expected that delegates and their wives to the five days meeting will number some 275.

Mr. T. Earl Hickey, Summerdale, Vice-President P. E. Institute of Chartered Accountants, will represent Mr. W. A. Morrell, President of the local Institute, who will be unable to attend.

Monday and Tuesday, opening days of the Convention, will be taken up with Council and Committee meetings. A tour of Navy ships, H. M. C. S. La Hulloise, and H. M. C. S. Swanson, under command of T. C. Fuller, which will be visiting Charlottetown at that time will be made Monday.

Tuesday evening delegates and their wives will attend a reception at Government House where they will be received by his Honour Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. J.A. Bernard.

Wednesday morning a technical session on municipal accounting, auditing and financial reports will be held. Chief speaker will be G.L. Beazley, K. C. Halifax, Commissioner of Municipal Affairs, Nova Scotia and James H. Lowther, Ottawa, Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In the afternoon delegates will drive to Cavendish and visit Green Gables. There will be golf, bathing, and a shore dinner followed by a country dance at the pectate warehouse, Fredericton.

His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald, civic and provincial officers will be invited to attend these sessions.

On Thursday two technical sessions will be held having to do with taxation problems of small businesses and problems relating to new tax regulations on depreciation, interest and bad debts. Chief speaker will be J. R. Petrie, Professor of Economics, University of New Brunswick. Other speakers will be G. P. Keeping, Montreal, H. J. Egar, Halifax and H. S. Moffet, Regina. The afternoon will be taken up with a paper concerning the problems of auditor and small business. J. H. Stewart, President of the American Institute of Accountants, will be chief

speaker. Others taking part will be J. R. M. Wilson, Toronto, Col. P. F. Seymour, Montreal and P. A. Nightengale, Halifax. Premier Jones will be guest speaker at the annual luncheon of the Association.

On Tuesday the ladies will attend luncheon and bridge at Dalvay House.

On Friday the annual meeting and election of officers will take place. The ladies will be taken on tour which will include a visit to the Provincial Building and the Experimental Farm. A dinner and dance will be held at the Charlottetown in the evening.
