33 Drivers In Automobile Race

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., (AP)—The fastest, and perhaps most dangerous, Indianapolis Speedway auto race will be held today when 33 drivers, headed by record-qualifier Jack McGrath, roar off in the 38th of the 200-lap, 500-mile marathons at 11 a.m. C.D. on the 2.5-mile track. On the basis of pre-race trials, a record average speed of better than 128 miles an hour is expected for the race with the \$250,000 jackpot.

Among the hot drivers are Bill Vukovich, the 1953 winner, 1950 winner Jimmy Parsons, record-holding 1952 champion Troy Ruttman, Sam Hanks, Jim Rathmann and McGrath.

McGrath, who qualified with a record speed of 141.033 mph, is favored to take the winner's \$90,000 share of the prize. He will be driving a new \$20,000 Hinkle Special.

Will Sponsor Track And Field Meet For Women

WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP)—The Nova Scotia Amateur Athletic Union voted Saturday to sponsor a 1954 Atlantic provinces track and field meet for junior, senior and women competitors.

The idea was proposed by the New Brunswick AAU some time ago. The Nova Scotia union did not fix a date but said the tournament will be held during the third week in August and annually thereafter.

President Maurice Hennigar told delegates that Massachusetts track coach Harold O'Connor would conduct a track and field clinic at Dalhousie University July 19 and 20.

Hennigar said in the presidential report that amateur athletics in Nova Scotia were suffering from "malnutrition." He said affiliated clubs, universities and the services must revitalize their programs if the amateur code was to resist the influences of professionalism.

Dorothy Walker of the Nova Scotia department of education said representations were being made to the Highland Society for the inclusion of women's events in the province's annual highland games.

Where possible, runners-up are carried as team substitutes.

Young Liberals Urge National Health Insurance

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's young Liberals Saturday urged the government to implement a national contributory health insurance plan in co-operation with the provinces.

However, it is understood that the 1954 national convention of the Young Liberal Federation of Canada rejected a proposal that private broadcasters be permitted to operate television stations in all Canadian cities.

Some 30 resolutions were approved at the three-day convention attended by about 340 delegates. They were presented to the government Saturday night, but convention officials said they could not be made public until their release was approved by federal Liberal party officials.

The resolution on health insurance asked for "the implementation by the government, as soon as necessary agreement may be reached with provincial governments, of a comprehensive contributory health insurance plan to be administered by respective provincial governments utilizing such agencies as may be designated by each such government."

The TV resolution said the government should be urged "to implement at once its announced policy of permitting alternative and competitive television service in all areas of Canada, especially the six major markets of Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa and Halifax."

These areas at present are reserved for CBC television stations. However, private broadcasters have been licensed in other centres.

Delegates said resolutions proposing a reduction in the 15-per cent tax on automobiles and the establishment of a joint Senate - Commons committee to study the feasibility of administering narcotics to confirmed addicts were defeated.

Sudden Death Of Travellers Rest Resident

—The death occurred suddenly at Travellers Rest on Saturday morning of James England Champion a the age of 82 years.

Mr. Champion, who was associated in his youth with his father, the late Alexander Champion of Travellers Rest, in one of the pioneer fox farms in Prince Edward Island continued to work in the fox industry until recent years. He lived all his life in this province except for three years in Ontario, when he was caretaker at a large ranch and travelled as fox inspector for the Ontario Fox Breeder's Association. Mr. Champion was a man of a quiet disposition. His chief hobby was flower gardening which engaged his attention until the time of his death.

He was married to the former Marjorie Matheson of Travellers Rest and had one daughter, Audrey, Mrs. Earl Smith of Summerside. He is also survived by the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Keith Canfield, Elmford, New York; Mrs. George Cass, Moncton, N.B.; Russell in Soranot, Pa.; Robert and Preston, Summerside.

International Trade Fair Opens Today

TORONTO (CP)—The world's high-pressure salesmen go into top gear today at the opening of the 11th Canadian International Trade Fair.

But the atmosphere is expected to be friendly despite intense competition between the 27 exhibiting countries, meeting this year at a time when world trade barriers are gradually being lowered.

For the first time in the fair's history such countries as Germany, Japan and Italy, now completing the reconstruction of war-shattered economies, meet on fairly equal terms to bid for customers.

Their wares are laid alongside the finest products of Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States in this billion-dollar super-market place where 60 countries will trade and import difficulties complicating European bargaining grounds, the tendency to use the Canadian fair as a neutral meeting place grows stronger each year.

Although the actual 235,000 square feet of display area is smaller than last year, the catalogue presents a wider range of products from saris to snow blowers, burglar alarms to black sturgeon caviar.

More than half the space is taken by Canadian industry, anxious to justify the 15,000,000,000 invested in new manufacturing facilities since the Second World War.

Britain is the next biggest exhibitor with the U. S. close behind. German displays cover 18,000 square feet.

Communism In Central America Touches Off New Tensions; Aimed At The U. S.

GUATEMALA (AP)—Communism, with a toe-hold in Guatemala, is touching off new tensions and jitters throughout the rest of Central America.

Thrush tropical republics on the approaches to the Panama canal are being flooded by rumors of wars, new labor upheavals, charges and counter-charges to add to their age-old tradition of distrust for each other.

Fears of Communism's spread in the Western hemisphere boiled over last week when Guatemala brought in a big shipment of arms from behind the Iron Curtain, and Washington countered swiftly with airlifts of arm to neighboring Honduras and Nicaragua.

These events capped months of seething unrest over the Communist issue throughout this rich banana and sugar cane area.

The Kremlin target primarily is, of course, the fertile fields for seeds of distrust among the workers employed by the United Fruit Co. and other U. S. - owned concerns which have a prominent part in this area's economy.

The area's measure of confidence in the United States has been shaken in recent months by Red propaganda. The current Communist aim does not appear to be to attempt the violent overthrow of governments to set up openly Red police regimes, but to infiltrate, expand and seize as many positions of power and influence as possible.

Under the left-wing government of President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman, the Reds have had their greatest success in realizing this aim in Guatemala.

An avowed Communist party member controls the big 80,000 member Guatemalan General Labor Confederation. A fellow traveler who has trekked to Moscow and to Kremlin-sponsored "peace" rallies in central Europe heads the only other labor force—the National Confederation of Farm Workers.

Reds hold seats in Parliament and weigh heavily in the government's radio and information services, as well as the social security system.

Arbenz is not a Communist, but his declarations in recent times appear to have grown closer and closer to the Moscow line.

Squabbles among the Central American nations themselves have become more heated over the growing issue of communism. Nicaragua, under the 20-year rule of strong man President Anastasio Somoza, right-wing government, abruptly broke off relations with Guatemala this month with charges that the Guatemalan embassy in Managua was used as a Red propaganda centre.

Somoza also has carried on a long-term feud with Costa Rica, whose anti-Communist government under President Jose Figueres has pushed a social improvement policy.

Nicaragua has accused Costa Rica of supporting a plot to assassinate Somoza. Costa Rica not only denies this, but in turn has called on the organization of American states to investigate "unfortunate revolutionary activities" in Nicaragua aimed at the Figueres government.

Honduras, next door, expelled two Guatemalan consuls last month on charges that they had some-thing to do with that country's first major strikes affecting workers in the rich banana plantations, factories, breweries and mines.

KARACHI, (Reuters)—The Pakistan government Sunday ousted the provincial ministry in East Bengal, called out troops and vested power in a "strong man" governor in a bid to restore law and order in the riot-torn province.

Prime Minister Mohammed Ali Jinnah said in a radio broadcast that the chief minister of the province, if failing to curb riots which have cost more than 500 lives in the last two weeks.
