Roberts, Keegan Probable All-Star Game Starters

CLEVELAND, (AP)—Robin Roberts of Philadelphia Phillies and Bob Keegan of Chicago White Sox are the probable starting pitchers for Tuesday's 21st all-star game in which the National League will try to make it five in a row over Casey Stengel's American Leaguers.
Pitchers and batting orders won't be announced until today when the umpires and managers meet with commissioner Ford Frick and the players start drifting in.
A crowd of about 65,000 is expected in the vast Municipal stadium where 69,812 gathered to set an all-star record back in 1935, the day Jimmy Fox's home run powered the Americans to a 4-1 victory.
The home run knockout punch, since the proud boast of the American League, makes the National 1-to-5 choice to win its fifth straight. The Americans swept four in a row from 1946 through 1949 but dropped four under Stengel, New York Yankee manager, who never has won an all-star game—nor lost a world series. The Americans still hold a 12-8 edge.

MAYS NOT STARTER

Willie Mays, New York Giant's sensational centerfielder who led ahead of Babe Ruth's home run record pace, won't be in the starting lineup. He will be one of manager Walter Alston's "reserves" for use after the starters have played their three innings as required by the rules.
With such sluggers as Brooklyn's Duke Snider, Cincinnati's Ted Kluszewski and St. Louis' Stan Musial taxing aim at the 320-foot right field fence, the eight-man American League staff may all see action.
If Keegan gets the nod it would be deserved recognition for a brilliant first half season in which he won 12 games.
Stengel has a wide choice in his pitching, in sharp contrast with last year at Cincinnati when he had only six on the staff, including Satch Paige. If he doesn't want

to go with Keegan, he can pick from Chicago's Andy Consuegra, who replaced Cleveland's ailing Mike Garcia, Washington's Bob Porterfield, Chicago's Virgil Trucks, Baltimore's Bob Turley or a left-hander, Bob Lemon of Cleveland has been bothered by a pulled muscle and Allie Reynolds of the Yanks has a sore leg. The chief was scratched from the lineup Sunday and will be replaced by Irv Noren, Yankee outfielder currently hitting a hot 342.

TWO LEFTHANDERS

Alston, who got in on a rain check when Chuck Dressen, manager of 1953 pennant winning Dodgers, was fired, has a seven-man pitching staff including two left-handers, Johnny Antonelli, the New York Giant's 13-game winner and Warren Spahn, Milwaukee veteran. With only Yogi Berra, and the switch-hitting Mickey Mantle batting lefty in the American starting lineup, Alston is expected to open with a righthander.
As Roberts, an 11-game winner, has started three of the last four all-star games for his league, he appears to be the logical choice. The Phillies ace righthander pitched seven innings at Brooklyn Friday night and left for a pinch-hitter during a Phil rally in the eighth.
The game is scheduled for 1:30 p. m. EDT and will be seen and heard on television and radio in Canada.

Reynolds Likely To Miss All-Star Game

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Allie Reynolds, ace righthander of the New York Yankees, is bothered by a pulled hip muscle and almost certainly will miss next Tuesday's All-Star game, Yankee manager Casey Stengel said Saturday.
Stengel, also manager of the American League team for the game, said Reynolds is unable to pitch without pain and probably will be sidelined for a week.

Australian Wins British Open Golf Championship

SOUTHPORT, England (AP)—Peter Thomson of Melbourne Friday won the first British open golf championship for Australia, to become the successor to Ben Hogan and the youngest champion since Bobby Jones.
The 25-year-old professional completed a nine-under-par 283 over the tough Royal Birkdale links to give Australia a grand slam of major British golf titles and end the link this most ancient of opens has held over players from down under. He is the first Aussie to win in 83 opens and his hometown friend, Doug Bachli, was the first to win the British amateur in May.
Thomson shot a two-under-par 71 in the final round Friday afternoon after a scorching 69 in the morning to defeat three other stars by a stroke. His early rounds were 72 and 71.
LOCKE STROKE BEHIND
One stroke behind Thomson were Bobby Locke of South Africa, Dai Rees of Wales and Syd Scott of England, all with 284s.
Three strokes back with a 286 was Jim Turnesa of Briarcliff, N. Y., who made the best bid of the American contingent. Jimmy Adams of England and Argentina's Antonio Cerdá also shot 286.
The other four Americans who qualified for the championship were down the list. Jimmy Deamat of Klamath Lake, N. Y., had a 289; Gene Sarazen, who won the British classic in 1932, had a 290; amateur Frank Stranahan of Toledo, O., Cecil Timm, the caddy for champions, he carried for Ben Hogan last year, for Dick Chapman in winning the 1951 British amateur, and in dozens of lesser British tournaments.
