## Baseball Information

**DAVE BOSWELL**, vice-president of the Maritime Baseball Association, has just returned from a meeting of that organization and has asked us to pass along a few details of that session.

Players intending to participate in brackets which are governed by age are asked to take particular note of the following information. All ages will be taken as of January 1, 1962 and the following are the divisions of the various groups: under 14-bantam; under 16-midget; under 18-juvenile and under 20-junior.

It was also decided by the Maritime organization that all provincial winners (this includes every division) must be named no later than September 8 and all Maritime finals are to be completed not later than the first weekend in October.

The body governing baseball in the Maritimes also decided that a uniform card system would be in vogue throughout Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island throughout this season.

This would indicate that the Maritime Baseball Association is going about its work in dead earnest and that no loose ends are likely to be found during this season.

We particularly commend the body for endeavouring to have things cleaned up at a reasonable time. Last fall it was downright ridiculous as some Maritime playoffs were played in bitter cold. This is a matter of conscience and there surely appears to be no need of such goings-on.

Now all the teams know what is expected of them and they must follow the rules and regulations if they wish to play under the banner of the Maritime Amateur Baseball Association.

It's time that some sharp teeth were put in the laws of this baseball body. The game will be much better for it.

**GUELPH (CP)** — Hamilton Red Wings took a 2-0 lead in their best-of-seven Memorial Cup finals with Edmonton Tuesday night, defeating Oil Kings 4-2 on third-period goals by Howie Menard and Lowell MacDonald, of Thornburn, N.S.

Oil Kings, although outshot 40-18 were in the game until the 15:30 mark of the final frame when MacDonald scored his fourth goal of the series on a Red Wings power play.

Hamilton's territorial edge was not as wide as their shooting edge but youthful Kings couldn't cope with Wings' scoring punch.

Harrison Gray turned in a

brilliant performance in the Edmonton cage, particularly in the first period when Hamilton enjoyed a 16-5 edge in the shots on goal.

Phil Martin and John Goffin were the other Hamilton marksmen while John Lashy and Norm Beaudin tallied for Edmonton.

Referee Gord Kerr of Winnipeg handed out nine minors to Edmonton and eight to Hamilton. But it was Edmonton's inability to launch a concerted power play that prevented them from making it closer. Buddy Blom had comparatively easy night compared to the over-worked Gray.

MacDonald also collected an assist.

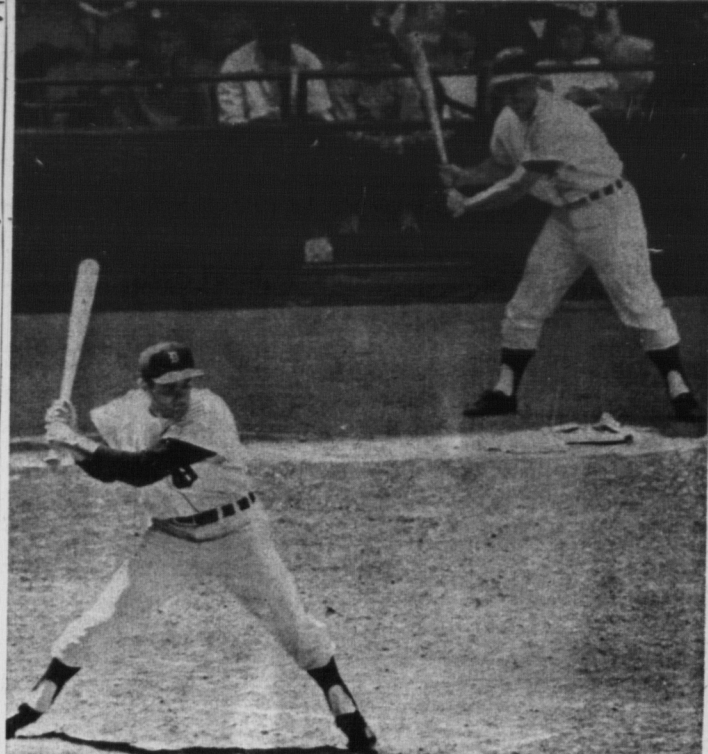

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Casey Stengel and Madison Avenue, a marriage made in a brewery boardroom, got together Tuesday. Casey responded by running a trade—Charlie Neal for Willie Mays—up the flag pole to see if any one saluted.

No one did.

Casey, who can steel four columns of space with a wink and a one-game winning streak, made a speech to the Sales Executive Club at a Madison Avenue hotel. The salesmen, who recognize a master, gave him a standing ovation.

"The amazing Mets are in an amazing slump" Stengel said, and then detailed the troubles of his New York ball club which tied a record for opening losses on their first try in the National League.

"We had to purchase these men (the Mets) from the demon salesman in baseball to get into business," Stengel said. "And sometimes we put these men back up for sale. And those wonderful salesmen, those wonderful people in baseball, would you believe it, they don't want those men back."

# Future Of Stirling Moss Depends On His Recovery

**LONDON (CP)** — Now that Britain's ace racing car driver, Stirling Moss, has made a start toward recovery from his latest batch of injuries, the question arises whether he will ever again compete professionally.

Both his parents say they want him to quit the tracks but have not discussed the matter with their son, still in serious condition in hospital after a crash Easter Monday at Goodwood track in Sussex.

Rob Walker, millionaire owner of a car-racing stable and Moss' sponsor in Grand Prix racing, said Tuesday he will add his voice to the parents' plea.

Moss, one of the sport's most consistently successful drivers but never winner of the top prize, the world driver's championship, resisted all earlier attempts to persuade him to stop racing.

But his return this time may depend on how completely he recovers.

He still has periods of unconsciousness. Even more worrying is the presence of some paralysis in his left side and difficulty with his speech.

His doctors refuse to make a long-term forecast. A hospital bulletin Tuesday said he has made "slow but steady" progress but there still remains a "definite weakness on the left side of the body."

During his 11-year career, the 32-year-old Moss has been runner-up four times for the major title. Every year some freak of fate—an accident or mechanical trouble—has kept him from winning the trophy.

## Camilo Pasqual Is Star As Twins Whip Orioles

Camilo Pasqual pitched and batted Minnesota to a 6-3 American League victory over Baltimore Orioles Tuesday as the Twins snapped a five-game home losing streak and stretched a modest winning streak to three games.

Pasqual hurled his fourth complete game for his fourth win against one setback this season. In the process he whacked a two-run home run off Oriole starter and loser Chuck Estrada in the second inning.

He permitted nine Baltimore hits, including Jim Gentile's fifth home run, a 400-foot poke into the right field bull pen with a man on in the eighth.

The Orioles counted their first run in the second as Brooks Robinson doubled and Gus Triandos followed with a single.

The Twins got that tally back quickly in the last of the second when Bob Allison singled to right and came all the way around on Earl Battey's double.

Minnesota broke the 1-1 tie later in the second when with two out Pasqual belted Estrada's two-strike changeup into the left field bleachers 360 feet away for his second major league homer. It scored Battey.

The Twins tacked on three insurance runs in the seventh and two in the eighth against relievers Wes Stock, Jim Lebew and Billy Hoelt.

Night action slated in the AL had Detroit at Kansas City, New York at Chicago, Los Angeles at Cleveland and Boston at Washington.

Milwaukee's night game at Philadelphia in the National League was postponed by rain. Other action saw Cincinnati at New York, Houston at St. Louis, Chicago at Los Angeles and Pittsburgh at San Francisco.

### Trail Coach Not Counting On Cup Yet

**TRAIL, B.C. (CP)** — Trail Smoke Eaters are ahead 2-1 in games in the race for Canada's senior amateur hockey title but coach Bobby Kromm isn't counting on taking the Allan Cup yet.

He thinks, he said Tuesday, Montreal Olympics are capable of better hockey than they've been playing.

"I think there are a lot more games to be played yet," Kromm said in reviewing Trail's 4-2 victory over Olympics Monday night in the third game of the best-of-seven series.

With his club due to go against Olympics again tonight, Kromm said:

"From here on it's going to be a tough one. The Olympics have a very good goalie and a strong defence. They know what to do with the puck and are fast to clear it out of their own zone."

As for Montreal coach Maurice Filion he said simply that Olympics just didn't get in close enough before firing and his boys just couldn't seem to get the puck in the net.

Olympics came out of the contest not only on the short end of the score but with some injuries.

Filion took forward George James to hospital Tuesday for treatment of a wrenched back and facial bruises. He was hurt in a collision with Trail's Russ Kowalchuk. James will not be in the Montreal lineup tonight.

### Baseball Meet Held In S'ide

**SUMMERSIDE**—The annual meeting of the Summerside Baseball League was held in a CJRW studio last night with the president, Dr. Hillard Clark in the chair. There will be three teams in the league this season: Summerside Pontiacs, Summerside Junior Legionaires, and the BCAP Flyers.

Dr. Clark was re-elected president, FO. Potter is the new vice-president, and Rick Ozon, secretary-treasurer. Honorary presidents are Mayor J. Ernest Morrison, and Capt. A. G. Dagg.
