P.E.I. Girl Guides Council Will Hold Training Session

"Programming" will be the keynote of the forthcoming provincial training session, conducted by the P. E. I. Council, Girl Guides of Canada.

Being held this year at Clinton Heights Motel, the training will be co-ordinated by Mary Donahoe, Deputy Provincial Training Commissioner.

Also in attendance to give leadership will be Mrs. H. W. Cudmore, a member of the National Training team. Open to all Guides and Commissioners, registration will be at 7 p. m. on Friday, November 25th and sessions will conclude on Sunday, Nov. 27th.

This training will follow the pattern set by the recent National Training Team which visited the 5 western provinces in 1966, and which plans to visit the remaining provinces in 1967.

Chosen because of the many years of devoted leadership and service they have given to the Guide movement were the 3 members of the National Team Mrs. Roy Holmes, Whonock, B. C., past Provincial Guide Commissioner; Mrs. W. S. Dart, Montreal, Provincial Honorary Secretary; and Mrs. H. W. Cudmore, P. E. I. Provincial Training Commissioner.

Feeling that too many rules and regulations have been incorporated in Guiding, this team endeavored to help simplify the Girl Guide program.

Having great faith in present day girls, they felt that the program must be flexible in order to stimulate the girls and give them freedom of activity.

This new approach to Guiding will be stressed at Clinton Heights keeping in mind the world theme of the movement - to develop love and understanding of other races and peoples. These new concepts also place great emphasis on the individual girls - endeavoring to recognize and nurture qualities of leadership, so that the women, of tomorrow, because of Guide training, will be healthy, happy citizens better prepared to take their rightful places in the world. The Cattle Are Brought To The Stable's Shelter

Now, after an absence, came the welcome sunshine.

"I'm afraid that I am a sun-worshipper" a housewife confessed recently with a bit of a chuckle. "I'm happy when it shines. And my work is fun. On a dark day, I have no spirit at all."

There it was at "lights-out" rising colorfully above the November hills. Bantams crowded cheerfully. Sparrows darted hither and yon on light wing. Pullets, golden-brown sang in the poultry-house across the yards. Mack had cleaned and prepared for them, the chicks of early summer. And one red-combed matron, a pretty lady, apparently grateful, presented the family with a first pullet's egg.

We may say that in our life on a farm, no sound has fallen more blithely on the ears of the farmwife in the brooding Fall days, there is little more inspiring or hopeful to her, than to hear that joyous cackle she recognizes, or to find a first egg in a nest!

Today at Alderlea, the carpentry was continued. A new window was inserted in the straw-barn to allow for incoming bales. And a new and smaller replacement is being fashioned, where before this was the wide rolling door, once our pride.

The sun shone on our morning then before long, due to snow-flurries, retired behind a convenient cloud, leaving us again mostly in shadow. . . At Rob's, younglings of the herd of cattle that had pastured on a far range of farm were trucked to home fields and stables. It was time to leave the spring-and brook-watered fields of summer, to come in to find shelter against the pre-winter chill. Toward dusk, there came a rounding in here of those of the herd not sheltered in the come-and-go shouting which the polebarn conveniently affords.

There is a finality in seeing the cattle-kind come down the lane from the fields, when at length the season demands it. Past, now are the summery days. Gone the sunshine and freshness of the springtime day which gave them freedom from stable and stall, and took them off to the greening fields and the brooks of the open spaces. Gone as is the fluff of the spring-time's seeded dandelions, the lilac and apple bloom, and the peppers' nostalgic tines. Past too are the hazy blue bands of the summer against the far hills the dear delight of the hay and lost also are the stilly and colorful autumn days. The cycle of the year's cropping has come the full turn to that time which puts the fields to rest.

The fire sings a gentle rest-tune. The white cat and her dark kitten nap cozily on the couch. The clock's tick - can you not fancy its sound as it serenely measures off the last hours of the day? "Snow tomorrow" the weather forecast declares.

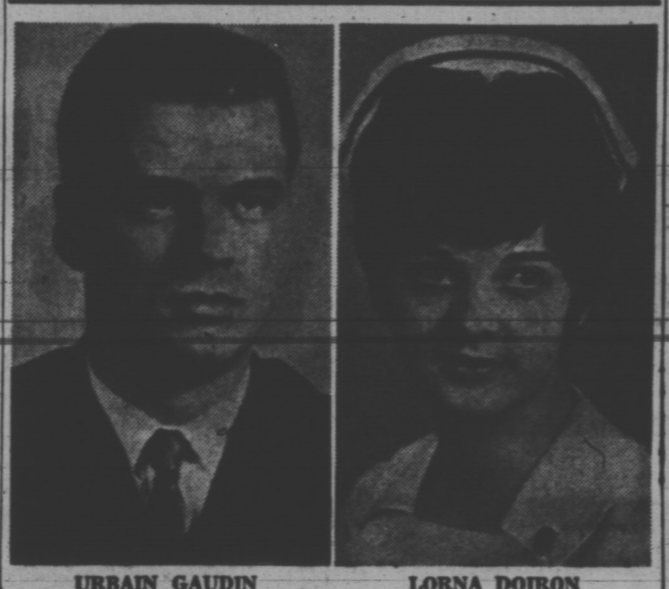
Special Masses Being Offered By Souris CWL

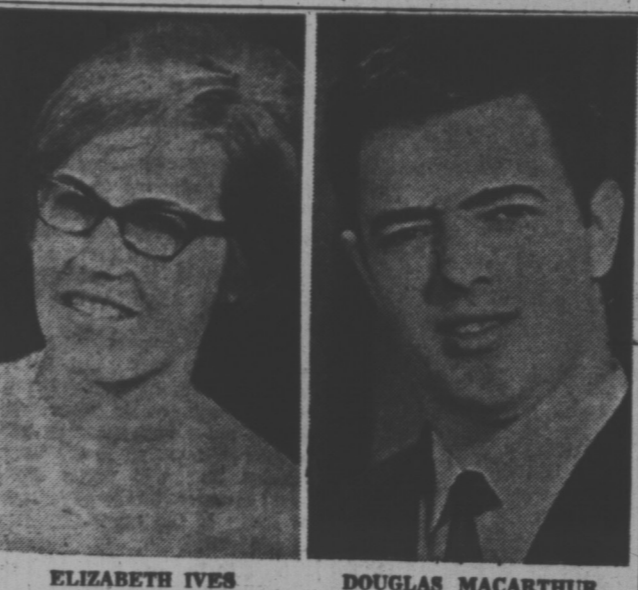
