pleted one pass all afternoon and their running game was nullified by the great work of the Panthers defensive line. On the whole the Panthers played as a team with each man giving 110% of himself.

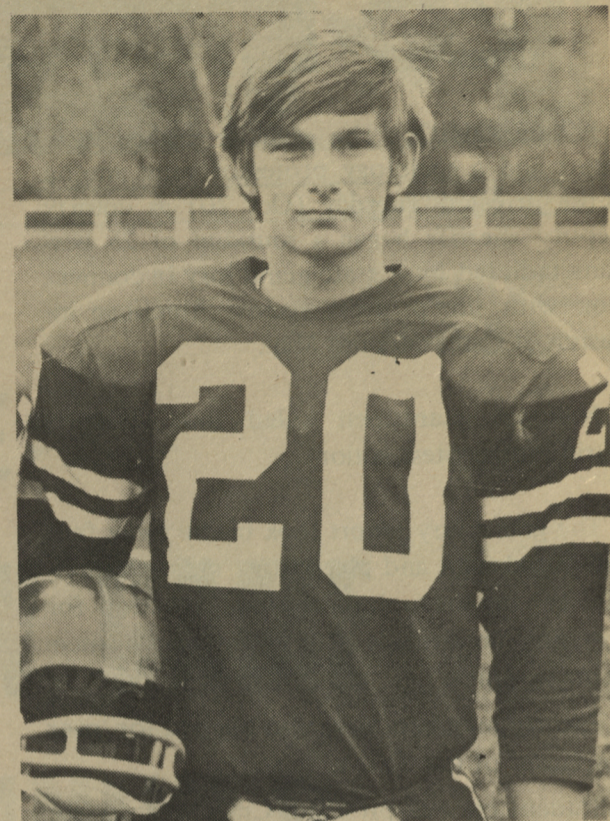
