In fact, he said, no new information had been given out except the number of bases that would be needed. That had been arrived at by dividing the number of squadrons by the capacity of the airfields.

Drew Not Satisfied

Mr. Drew said he believes that what the Prime Minister told the House "does not adequately deal with the question."

It was difficult to accept Mr. Claxton's statement that the report carried by the Canadian Press—part of which Mr. Drew had read to the House Wednesday—went beyond what the Minister actually had said.

"In the first place," Mr. Drew said, "it carried the name of one of the most famous war reporters, who since the war has been dealing with military matters. Mr. Douglas How of the Canadian Press is one of the most highly-regarded members of the Parliamentary Press Gallery."

How's report from Rotterdam had been detailed, he said. It had quoted the Minister as saying the airdromes would cost \$100,000,000.

"I would be very reluctant to believe that Douglas How would use a statement of that kind unless it was made," Mr. Drew said.

Another thing that made it difficult to accept the minister's statement was that a similar statement had been carried by the British United Press, by the United Press in the United States and by the Associated Press in the U.S. and throughout the world.

Mr. Drew read from the AP report in the New York Herald-Tribune, quoting Mr. Claxton as saying Canada would build four or five new airstrips and as estimating the cost at \$100,000,000.

He thought the similarity in the stories was a "strange coincidence."

"It would be remarkable," he said, "if at a press conference, representatives of several of the best-known press agencies introduced statements not made by the Minister."

Another Statement

Mr. Drew also was critical of another statement attributed to the Minister Tuesday by How from The Hague, quoting him as announcing Canada's plans to erect permanent quarters for the 27th Brigade in West Germany, with construction to start in the next few months. The story said the barracks were expected to cost between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000.

Mr. Drew said that was "a very definite statement of policy" not covered by the statement of the Prime Minister and not covered by a statement Mr. Claxton had made to the House on European plans Oct. 22.

"It goes to the whole question of whether statements of policy and commitments of money are to be made without this House, and Parliament, knowing about them," Mr.

New Fish Meal Plant Operating Successfully

Farther advances in plans have been made by the Eastern Fisheries Ltd., Souris, since the Guardian reported their intention of building a new plant in that centre. Since then they put the new fish meal plant into operation and are intending to triple the quantity of machinery now in use. At the present time the fish meal plant has a batch cooker weighing 15 tons and an automatic 35 horsepower oil burning boiler. The power comes from a diesel engine of 20 horsepower while the grinding is done in a large hammer mill. Estimated cost of the present machinery is over \$16,000.

Conservatives Set For Long "Run" In Ontario

TORONTO, Nov. 23 — (CP) — The Progressive Conservative Party got set today for a long run as the governing authority in Ontario. Premier Leslie Frost came out of Thursday's general election with the greatest majority of seats ever accorded an Ontario political party. Behind him in the 24th legislature since confederation will be a solid phalanx of supporters. One of his problems will be the seating arrangement in the new House.

Evidence Concluded In Damages Case

Evidence was completed yesterday in the damages case being heard in the Supreme Court at Georgetown before Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan. Court adjourned until Monday when counsel will make their pleas and the judge address the jury. Mrs. Helena L. Robertson is seeking \$60,000 damages from the Canadian National Railways and Chester Burke, third party. The action followed a fatality at a level crossing near Cardigan in September, 1950, when Mrs. Robertson's husband was killed.

When court resumed yesterday, Aeneas MacDonald, C.N.R. trainman from Georgetown, concluded the evidence he began the previous day. He was a witness called by the plaintiff. Others were Mrs. Catherine Martell, Georgetown, John W. Wallace, C.N.R. section foreman, Wm. Albert Otto Roach, road foreman with a construction company working on the road where the accident occurred, Fred H. Currie, C.N.R. conductor, Georgetown, and Harry Lavers, C.N.R. relieving section foreman. The plaintiff called one witness in rebuttal, Daniel J. MacDonald, land surveyor, Charlottetown.

The Progressive Conservative leader said he was not suggesting Canada should not accept such responsibilities as were entailed in her N.A.T.O. obligations and approved by Parliament. But statements made by the Defence Minister were of great importance, particularly when taken in relation to where they were made.

The European interviews with Mr. Claxton were on the occasion of the arrival of Canadian troops to join Gen. Eisenhower's forces. Mr. Drew said a Canadian Press dispatch from the Hague Nov. 21 had quoted Mr. Claxton as saying that the production of Sabre jets in Montreal was the biggest phase of Canada's defence production. Mr. Claxton had indicated he considered the Sabre jet was better than the Russian Migz used in Korea.

While Mr. Claxton was making his statement, Mr. Drew went on, Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg was saying in Washington that the Russian planes can outperform the F-86 jets.

Mr. St. Laurent suggested Mr. Drew had not read the whole clipping of the press reports on construction of the barracks in Germany. Mr. Claxton said the barracks would be built by Germans and that it was hoped a way would be found to prevent Canada from becoming a land owner in Germany. Mr. Claxton expressed the hope that construction of the barracks would be considered part of Canada's contribution to N.A.T.O.

Mr. Drew said there had been no announcement of policy or discussion in the Commons on a proposal to build barracks under an arrangement such as disclosed by Mr. Claxton in Germany.

War Games For Halifax Area

HALIFAX, Nov. 23 — (CP) — Rear Admiral Roger Bidwell, C.B.E., new chief of the Atlantic naval command, announced here today there would be a "full scale" land, sea and air exercise to test the defences of this important base in mid-summer.

He hoped the test would be integrated with civilian defence efforts and that the new naval seaward defence establishment, building at the entrance to the port, would be ready by the time the exercise was held.

Well Known Moncton Publisher Retires

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 23 — (CP) — After more than 45 years of active association in the publishing business in Moncton, John C. Keating, president and general manager of the Moncton Publishing Company, Limited, has retired. He leaves behind him an eminently successful career and a record of achievement not often equalled in the field of business.

Known and highly respected in printing and newspaper circles throughout Canada, his career covered a period during which greatest strides were made in the printing industry and to that progress he contributed his full share.

Mr. Keating began his career in the newspaper and printing business as an accountant with the Times Publishing Company, Moncton, the firm which he joined in April, 1908, after a brief but successful period as a school teacher. Six years later he was appointed advertising manager and later was promoted to business manager.

When the well-known general manager of the firm, which published the Moncton Daily Times as well as operated a job printing department.

In 1945 Mr. Keating acquired ownership of the Times Printing Company and led it into a merger with the Transcript Limited, publishers of the Moncton Transcript. He became president and general manager of the new company—the Moncton Publishing Company, Limited and held this executive post until his retirement.

In addition to his interest in the job printing industry Mr. Keating took an early interest in improved methods of news gathering and news dissemination. He became one of the first members of the Canadian Press, the Canadian daily newspapers co-operative news agency, and continued his interest in that organization until his retirement. He was also a member of the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association and a regular attendant of its business meetings.

Rallies Climax Newfoundland Election Campaign

(By Canadian Press Staff Writer) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 23 — (CP) — Monster rallies were planned tonight by the Liberals and Progressive Conservatives as a climax to their campaigns for the Newfoundland Provincial election Monday.

The Liberals, seeking re-election under Premier Smallwood, will hold their big show here tonight.

Tomorrow night the Progressive Conservatives are sponsoring what they call a citizen's forum to hear a German optical scientist tell of what he says are "surprising manipulations" behind establishment of new industries in the province.

The German, Lothar Sennewald, was refused financial assistance by Mr. Smallwood's Government when he sought to establish a plant here.

Gordon Higgins, Progressive Conservative Federal member for St. John's East who has been sparking the Opposition campaign, invited Mr. Smallwood to attend tomorrow's meeting. The Premier declined, saying he had other plans.

Liberals, who have already taken four of the 28 seats in the House by acclamation, are contesting all the 23 seats open for voting Monday. Voting in Labrador was deferred. Progressive Conservatives have 21 candidates in the field and there are also six independents.

In the 1949 election, Newfoundland's first as a Canadian Province, Mr. Smallwood and his Liberals took 22 seats, the Progressive Conservatives five and an Independent one. At dissolution earlier this month the standing was: Liberals 20, Progressive Conservative five, Independent two and vacant one. Voting Monday will be from 8 a.m. N.S.T. (7:30 a.m. A.S.T.) to 8 p.m. N.S.T.

Under the 1913 Election Act—which requires all ballot boxes from each district to be collected at a single point for counting—the final results will not be known for days.
