Scientists Find Death at Certain Age Inheritable

American Philosophical Society Told of Experiments With Dogs Proving Theory.

PHILADELPHIA, April 27—Successful penetration of some of the mysteries of life and death was reported yesterday by members of the American Philosophical Society, the oldest scientific society in the United States, at its annual meeting which opened here yesterday with the elite of the scientific world in attendance. Among the conquests reported by the scientists was the demonstration that death at a particular period in life can be inherited through the death of genes in vital cell groups. Dr. Charles C. Stockard, professor of anatomy, Cornell University, described the inheritance in dogs of a type of paralysis that occurred at particular periods of growth and closely resembled a paralysis that developed in children of comparable age. The effect resembles infantile paralysis but differs from it in that infantile paralysis involves larger areas of the body, while the experimental type involves particular motor nerves serving the lower limbs. Dogs in which this paralysis of the hind limb occurred naturally were mated and in the second generation one-third of the offspring developed the paralysis at the same age as their parents, in whom it appeared when three months old. The results were reproduced in succeeding generations. The cause of the paralysis in the genes, the units of inheritance, of germ cells which are reproduced in all cells in the body, according to Professor Stockard. This inheritance acts as a death-producing or lethal effect on certain motor and sympathetic nerve cells in the gray matter of a limited region of the spinal cord, said Professor Stockard. It seems as though certain nerve cells in a sharply limited region of the spinal cord inherit an externally abbreviated life span, causing their elimination from the nerve cell population at an early age, while all other nerve cells live throughout the animal's life. There is no evidence of infection being involved in this death reaction. It is a spontaneous death and degeneration of the cell itself. Dr. Yandell Henderson, professor of physiology at Yale University, who has previously demonstrated that carbon dioxide is as essential to respiration as oxygen and whose method of administering carbon dioxide has resulted in the recovery of many persons overcome by the deadly carbon monoxide, reported yesterday that persons under anesthesia for surgical operations in whom circulation and respiration fail are suffering from a lack of carbon dioxide. "In the early stages of anesthesia," said Dr. Henderson, "patients sometimes breathe excessively and thereby decrease the carbon dioxide in the blood, as a result of this condition, called acapnia respiration and the circulation may fail. This tendency to collapse is now counteracted and prevented by the inhalation of carbon dioxide diluted either with oxygen or air. Inhalation of carbon dioxide is now the accepted means of inducing a rapid elimination of anesthetic and preventing pulmonary complications. "Instead of being the cause of asphyxia, carbon dioxide has in this way been demonstrated to be the most effective cure both for asphyxia and for the depression of vitality following anesthesia and surgical operations."

Passengers in Horton's car, all killed instantly, were George Radmond, 27; James Forbes, 27 and Desmond Robson, 26. They all lived in Mimico. Horton's home was in nearby Swansea.
