Boxer Gonzales Set For Bout

NEW YORK (AP) — Manuel Gonzalez saw his name on the Madison Square Garden marquee for the first time Wednesday.  
"This is a dream come true," said the 26-year-old welterweight boxing challenger who can't read or write but can make out Griffith vs. Gonzalez. "I beat him before and I can beat him again—I know I can do it," said the Texan from Odessa.  
The oddsmakers think differently. They have made welterweight champion Emile Griffith a 14-to-5 favorite to win the 15-round title match Friday night. Gonzalez, a former cotton-pickier who has been fighting 8 1/2 years, won a split decision in a non-title 10-rounder with Griffith at Houston last Jan. 26.  
"It was a hometown decision," said Griffith.  
Gonzalez has a 37-12-6 won-lost-draw record. But it is deceiving. He has won 13 straight fights in the last 2 1/2 years and is undefeated as a welterweight.

Canadian Betting Habits Climb To Record Heights

Toughest job at Canadian racetracks this year, aside from picking winners, was counting all that money. A record \$169,926,335 slid through the pari-mutuel windows.  
It was the 16th straight year in which betting on the thoroughbreds reached a new high. Last year it was \$161,515,131.  
The figure is separate from harness racing on which totals are not completed until January. In 1964 the harness tracks took in more than \$163,000,000.  
Provincial betting records topped this season in all six provinces with thoroughbred tracks—Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. There are none in the four Atlantic provinces.  
A Cross-Canada Survey by The Canadian Press also showed that 14 of the 18 tracks in operation set betting marks of their own, despite generally poor weather that plagued every province except B.C.  
The exceptions were Toronto Greenwood and Fort Erie in Ontario, and Lethbridge and Lake McGregor in Alberta, all of which missed their 1964 records by a nose. They also reported the worst weather.  
B.C. FORGES AHEAD  
B.C. bettors were in especially good form, turning up in record numbers to lay \$22,934,312 on the line, up almost 20 per cent from the \$19,226,105 they wagered last year. The season there covered 118 racing days, a gain of five from 1964.  
Of the national take, about \$134,700,000 was pocketed by winners. The track operators, who are allowed nine per cent for purses and profits, grossed about \$15,300,000; the provinces came away with about \$11,500,000; their varying tax shares and the federal government collected about \$6,500,000 for supervisory services. They include film patrols, saliva tests and RCMP surveillance.  
Ontario, as usual, accounted for 60 per cent of the betting. Its three tracks took in \$101,872,209 with Toronto Woodbine's record clip more than offsetting slight declines at Fort Erie and Greenwood. Last year, in an identical 196-day season, Ontario fans backed their choices with \$99,464,915.  
The only thoroughbred racing in Quebec is at Montreal's Blue Bonnets which had to buck a transport strike and a gas station tie-up. But it boosted its betting to \$15,787,423 from \$15,562,205. The season was unchanged at 42 days.  
On the Prairies, the nags did even better than the crops.  
Assiniboia Downs at Winnipeg, Manitoba's only track, counted \$8,410,026 to eclipse the previous record of \$8,349,994 set in 1962. Last year the figure was \$8,328,965 on the same 42-day season.  
Officials said it was the best season since Assiniboia opened in 1958 with attendances swelled largely by U.S. fans from North Dakota and Minnesota points just across the border. Special days were arranged for U.S. communities.  
Saskatchewan's three tracks had a mutual handle of \$2,440,361 to surpass the 1964 record of \$2,188,729. Alberta's six collected \$18,482,004 compared to \$16,744,394.

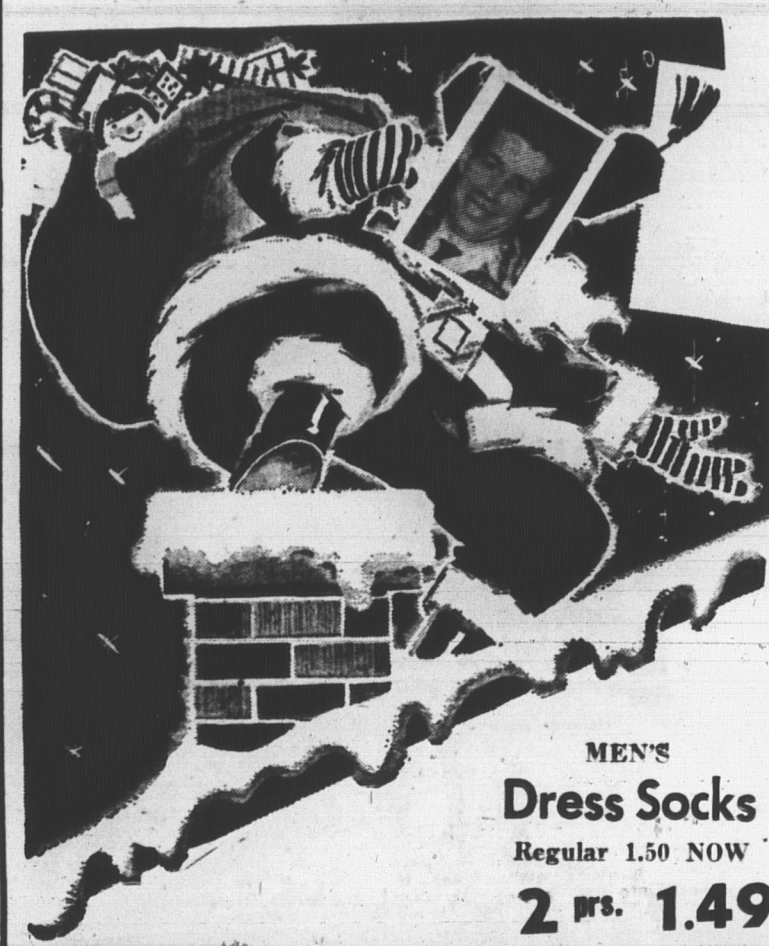
Shotput Star Plans Surgery

TORONTO (CP)—Nancy McCredie, 20-year-old Olympic shotputter from Brampton, Ont., plans to enter hospital next week for surgery on a damaged right knee in preparation for next August's British Empire Games in Jamaica.  
Miss McCredie, who won gold medals in the shot put and discus throw at the 1963 Pan-American Games, required a car-

riage operation on her left knee three months before the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. She finished seventh in the shot and did not place in the discus.  
Doctors then discovered she needed a similar operation on her right knee.  
Nancy currently holds the Canadian juvenile, native and open marks in shot and discus as well as Pan-American Games marks in both events.
