SAN ISIDRO, Argentina (AP)—Veteran Sam Snead, playing with a handaged 74.47 foot, fired a six-under-par 64 practice round Tuesday for the 10th annual Canada Cup golf competition.

Arnold Palmer, the Lathrop, Pa. power hitter, who, with Snead, is expected to carry the United States to its third consecutive championship, shot a par 70.

Playing almost flawless golf, Snead shot 33-32 on the swanky, 65-year-old Jockey Club course where the international tournament opens Thursday. Palmer won a three-under-par 67 Monday, said he had trouble with his iron shot Tuesday. Snead, suffering from a pinched nerve, said he was in considerable pain. "It came on two months ago and gradually is getting worse."

# Kelso Will Run In International

LAUREL, Md. (AP)—The trainer of Kelso, the horse of the year in 1960 and 1961, said Tuesday his horse would run in Monday's \$125,000 Washington D.C. International only if there is a fast track.

"I've talked it over with Mrs. du Pont. (Mrs. Richard C. du Pont, owner of Kelso) and we decided it would not be fair to Kelso to start him on the Laurel track in its present condition," said trainer Carl Hanford.

"We've definitely decided Kelso will start only if the track is fast."

The turf over which the Laurel track is being improved is one mile in 1:41, and ran the last two turfs in 1:12 seconds each.

The only other International entry engaging in a workout Tuesday was the Japanese horse, Takamagahara, who went one mile in 1:44, with jockey Yoshie Mohr aboard.

The Canadian entry, Lebon M. L. will engage in a major workout today on the grass, trainer Roy Johnson said.

Expected to arrive late Tuesday was Delvin, the Italian horse. The German, English and Peruvian entries are due here today, and the two Russian horses Thursday.

## Fate of Grey Cup Telecast Hinges On BPG Meeting

OTTAWA (CP)—The Board of Broadcast Governors goes into a private huddle here today over one of the season's most controversial off-field football squabbles.

Out of the board's closed-door session—falling a prior settlement—may emerge the television fate of the 1963 Grey Cup game.

With less than four weeks left before the Dec. 1 football classic in Toronto, no agreement has yet been reached between the publicly-owned CBC and the private CTV television networks in their festering dispute over the telecast of the game.

The BPG—regulatory body in Canada—a broadcasting—stands firm on its contention that the public interest can be served only if it is possible for CTV viewers to see the game in all parts of the country.

Most of the basketball players, including the United States and the Soviet Union, had entered the tournament, scheduled Dec. 1-15, but the Soviet Union later withdrew.

R. William Jones, secretary-general of the federation, said the championships will be held in another country on another date, Jones added.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Branch Rickey's proposal to retire St. Louis Cardinal outfielder Stan Musial is the apparent cause of a major disagreement with baseball Cardinal general manager Branch Devine.

Club president August A. Busch Jr. said Tuesday Stan Musial not only will play with the Cardinals in 1963 but Musial will become a Cardinal vice president when he decides to retire.
