OTTAWA, Sept. 1—(CP)—Almost 10,000,000 jobs have been found for workers in the first nine years of operation of National Employment Service, Labor Minister Gregg said today. At the same time, the Minister said, benefits totalling \$289,384,000 had been paid out of the Unemployment Insurance Fund, which totalled \$593,265,000 at the end of July.
