PROVISIONS FOR IRELAND.—A meeting was held at Summerfield, Lot 67, on the 3rd inst., when the following resolutions were adopted:—

Whereas, Famine is at present ravaging the South and West of Ireland;

And, whereas, Providence has bestowed a plentiful harvest on this Island during the past season;

Resolved, That we deeply sympathize with the sufferers by the famine, and are of opinion that collections of produce should be made in the different settlements on this Island, and the Local Government should be asked to forward them to responsible parties in Ireland for distribution. And further Resolved, That we request the Press of the Island to take this subject up and use their influence with the Government and the people to make the movement successful.

The story of the frightful hardships endured by two young men named Donald McLeod and John McDonald, during the late storm, has reached the city. On the evening previous to the storm they left this city for Orwell, and while on the ice, were overtaken by the storm. They lost their way and during Tuesday night, Wednesday and Wednesday night, wandered to and fro seeking shelter which they could not find. Twice they walked to the open water of the Gulf, and it was only when the storm abated on Thursday morning that they found their way to a house on Point Prim, totally worn out by their wanderings during the dreadful storm.

We are pleased to learn that the House of Assembly has, in Committee, passed the Bill authorizing a steam Ferry on the Cardigan River. This will benefit Georgetown and a large section of country to the north and east of Georgetown.

THREE cases of drunkenness were tried by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. The culprits were each fined \$2 and costs. A young man was also fined \$4 and costs for driving over a countryman.

ENGLISH ELECTIONS!

Liberal Majority Still increasing.

Public Reception for Gladstone

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

LONDON, April 9. Five additional seats were gained to-day by the Liberals.

The latest election returns give the Liberals 337 seats, Tories 203, and Home Rulers 43.

Lord Hartington has been returned for North-east Lancashire, and the Liberals have won both seats.

DUBLIN, April 9. Parnell is stamping the county of Cork, denouncing Col. Thurston.

BERLIN, April 9. In the Reichstag, to-day, a debate began on the second section of the Army Bill. The paragraph fixing the peace strength of the army until March, '88, at 427,270 men, was adopted.

LONDON, April 9. The Times estimates that the Liberals in the new House will number about 340; Home Rulers, from 60 to 65. The Conservatives can hardly count on more than 250. The Liberals will thus find their position in the New Parliament nearly the same as that of the present Government in the late Parliament.

At a meeting of the Liberal Executive Committee yesterday, a deputation was appointed to proceed to Hawarden to urge Mr. Gladstone to consent to a public reception in London.

CABUL, April 9. Abdul Rah Man Khan has reached Ghazi. On the road to Charillan he has written to Kohistanist to join him, and already 3,600 Irregulars have left in obedience to this order.

BERLIN, April 9. The contemplated meeting between the Emperor William and Queen Victoria will not take place, in consequence of events in England having hastened the Queen's return.
