To Drink Or Not To Drink

Though indulgence in intoxicating liquors is not dealt with in the Ten Commandments, it is involved in and related to the moral principles and policies found there.

Just as many others believe in total abstinence. If drinking were indulged in by evil, disreputable people only, and all the "good people" in the world were abstainers, there would be no problem.

The passage from Paul's letter to the Ephesians contains an exhortation that we use our God-given free will to walk circumspectly, striving always to do God's work, despite the evil surrounding us.

Of all the changes taking place in the Roman Catholic Church, none is more significant than her attitude to the distribution of the Scriptures and her willingness to read and distribute Protestant Bibles.

It is stated that the common Bible idea is now generally accepted by the Catholic Church and the Bible Societies. Of the 502 languages in which translations are now going forward under the supervision of the Bible Societies, the Catholics are sharing in two-dozen cases.

There is, and always will be, a wide difference of opinion among honest — and frequently among Christian — people regarding the use of alcoholic beverages.

New Mine Shares Mountain With Some Top Ski Trails

ROSSLAND, B.C. (CP) — Red Mountain Mines Limited's newly-opened molybdenum mine shares the nearby mountain with some of the finest ski trails in Canada.

Opened Tuesday by B.C. Mines Minister Donald Brothers, the mine is producing 54 per cent molybdenum concentrate at the rate of 450 tons a day and shipping it in colorful red and black drums to markets in New York.

Red Mountain produced an estimated \$60,000,000 worth of gold and copper in numerous small operations in the 40 years preceding 1929.

The space-age metal is now much in demand for alloys, electronic and heat-resistant uses.

Mining practically stopped after 1929 except for sporadic operations by Cominco Ltd., and the Red Mountain Ski-Club turned the treacherous slopes into a paradise for skiers.

Ashton W. Johnston of Toronto, president of Red Mountain Mines, told about 120 mining and investment men at Tuesday's opening, that it cost about \$2,000,000 to put the property into production.

EXCEEDS CAPACITY The company employs 30 men at the mining and mill operation. The plant has a rated capacity of 400 tons of ore per day, but has been handling up

to 450 tons daily since mining began in the spring. The 54 per cent concentrate is being sold in New York at the current price of \$1.65 per pound by Metal Mines Ltd. of Toronto, the firm which is providing management for the mine.

Metal Mines, the operating arm of Canada Faraday Corp., and Canadian Nickel Co. Ltd. each own 20 per cent of Red Mountain Mines and the other 60 per cent is held by Torwest Resources (1962) Ltd. of Vancouver. The two eastern firms financed the project.

H. Brodie Hicks of Toronto, Red Mountain managing director and vice-president of Metal Mines, said proven and indicated ore reserves are about 1,000,000 tons averaging 4 per cent.

Total dividends of \$612,575 were paid on preferred shares on a regular quarterly basis. At the year's end there were over 2,000 registered common shareholders and almost 2,000 shareholders of 1965 and 1966 preferred shares.
