

# Bermuda Talks, British Strike Among Top Events

It was "Ike" and "Dag" talked, UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld was in Cairo to see Egyptian President Nasser, seeking a proclamation of non-belligerency from the dictator.

President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Macmillan soon were deep in discussion of the Middle East peril and other problems that confront the United Nations around the world.

The Gaza strip, the Gulf of Aqaba and the Suez Canal were the first topics of the four-day talks that will be followed by a conference between Macmillan and Prime Minister St. Laurent of Canada.

While "Ike and Dag" talked, UN Secretary-General Hammarskjöld was in Cairo to see Egyptian President Nasser, seeking a proclamation of non-belligerency from the dictator.

There was one bright spot late in the week when government and railway union leaders reported they have found abasis of settlement of a threatened walkout that would involve 370,000 men.

Other settlement hopes arose when officials of unions and shipyards where the trouble originally began reported they had reached a basis to negotiate the end of a strike involving 200,000 men.

In the absence of Prime Minister Macmillan, Labor Minister Iain Macleod struggled to cope with the walkouts, in which unions demanded a 10-cent wage increase. Engineering unions called a phased strike, beginning Saturday with 1,000,000 men and eventually to affect 2,500,000.

**TEAMSTER INQUIRY**

Dave Beck, president of the 1,400,000-member International Union of Teamsters, finally

agreed to appear before a United States Senate investigating committee—with his personal financial records.

The committee delved deeper and deeper into the financial activities of U.S. teamster officials.

On the griddle was Frank Brewster, a teamster vice-president who admitted that union funds got mixed up with horses and jockeys. Beck said in a television interview that he borrowed \$400,000 from the union with no interest.

Powerful union vice-president James Hoffa had been arrested on a bribery charge in connection with the hearing.

"It's not good," Brewster said as one point.

**ADAMS TRIAL**

Newspaper readers found the murder trial of Dr. John Bodkin Adams, portly society physician, just about as fascinating as a thriller mystery novel.

The 58-year-old doctor was in the prisoner's dock in London's Old Bailey, charged with killing an elderly woman—who remembered him in her will—with massive doses of drugs.

Testimony appeared to go against the doctor early in the week, with nurses giving evidence of heavy dosages. But under merciless cross-examination and confronted with notebook-records of the treatment in her own handwriting, a nurse tearfully admitted her memory was wrong.

The doctor had a little champagne party in his cell that night. But the next day the Crown charged that someone had tampered with the notebook.

**PHILIPPINES' SORROW**

Mourning grew to hysteria in Manila following the death in a plane crash of President Ramon Magsaysay.

Sorrowing citizens swept aside police lines and tore open the door of the plane that brought the president's body to the city from the scene of the jungle tragedy that took 24 lives.

One report said Magsaysay had expressed belief that political enemies were set on killing him before his planned bid for re-election in November.

Investigators studied the crash for evidence of sabotage. Vice-President Carlos Garcia took over the reins of government.

**SCOTTISH LAMENT**

Not for the first time, talk in the rugged island of South Uist, in the southern Hebrides, turned to emigration to Canada.

The British government plans to establish a rocket-launching site in Uist, and the 3,000 islanders fear it will shatter their way of life that goes back 1,500 years.

Rev. John Morrison, a Roman Catholic priest, said that rather than live with rockets, the islanders would move to Canada, preferably a Newfoundland-district island.

Immigration Minister Pickers-gill and Newfoundland's Premier Smallwood commended their judgment.

Many Scots from Hebrides settled in Canada in years gone by, with many immigrants from the Uist area in Cape Breton, among other places.

**CYPRIOUS DEFIANT**

New attempts to settle the bitter dispute in strategic Cyprus met failure.

Britain accepted a NATO offer to mediate the quarrel, but the offer was rejected by the 400,000 Greek Cypriots, who want union with Greece, and the Greek government.

Greece and Britain are all members of NATO. The 100,000 Turkish Cypriots on the Mediterranean island oppose union with Greece.

The Greek Cypriot underground offered a truce if Britain ended the exile of Archbishop Makarios, but the British countered they would free the politically-minded cleric only if he called a halt to violence and remained away from the island.

**Government Cold Storage For N. B.**

ST. STEPHEN, N.B. (CP) — The weekly St. Croix Courier says the New Brunswick and federal governments and Connors Bros. Ltd. of Black's Harbor, N.B., plan construction of two plants in southern New Brunswick to aid the province's fishing industry.

The newspaper quotes Dr. A. M. A. McLean, managing director of Connors Bros., as saying a \$200,000 fish filleting plant to be built by the company will make "quite a difference" in the fishing area's employment situation.

A publicly operated cold storage plant, financed by the federal and provincial governments, is designed to provide markets for

fishermen operating draggers built with assistance from the provincial fishermen's loan board. The \$300,000 plant is expected to hold between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 pounds of fish.

The filleting factory project was mentioned earlier this week in the legislature by Industry and Development Minister Roger Pichette.

Beaver Harbor, site of the plant, is in southern New Brunswick on the Bay of Fundy coast.

Arnold Wigham, Montague; Gilbert R. Clements, Montague; Donald Martin, Charlottetown; John Bell, West Royal; and Allison MacLean, Summersville.

Mr. Hessian in making reference to the new museum located in the old post office building at Montague, said, the people of Montague and for that matter the citizens of the Island should be proud of the fine museum which has been started chiefly through the efforts of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Montague.

He said the number of museum pieces loaned to the museum was increasing every day and he predicted that it would not be long
