NEW DEVICES DISPLAYED Mounted Police Adopt New Road Hazard Warning Sign

The new "safety triangle" recently adopted by the RCMP is shown in the above picture at the left. This triangle is bright red and fluorescent making it readily discernible at night in the headlights of an oncoming car. This will be used at accident scenes, and any other road hazard scene where the police are in attendance.

This symbol has been used by both police and civilian motorists in the European countries for some years, and has now been generally adopted and recognized internationally as a sign of road hazard. The Canadian Highway Safety Council has recently recommended its use as the standard for civilian type, 18 inches on each side, can be seen in the above photograph at the right. The size recommended for use by commercial vehicles is the same size as that used by the police; 36 inches on each side. The RCMP hereby endorses this additional safety precaution and urge every motorist to obtain and use this new safety device.

The triangle is easily folded up into a compact, flat parcel and comes in a handy plastic carrying case. It is an ideal size and shape for storing in the small space under the front seat of a car. The folded up civilian size is approximately 18 inches long, 2 1/2 inches wide and about 1 1/2 inch thick.
