A complete outline of the position of Prince Edward Island in relation to the freight rate structure of Canada will be given the Royal Commission on Transportation when it sits here November 12 as part of its trans-Canada hearings.

It is believed that only two briefs will be presented, one on behalf of the provincial government and the other by the Maritime Motor Transport Association.

Now under preparation, the Government's brief is being readied with factual material by E. Graham Rogers, director of transportation.
