## THE BATTLE AT SANTIAGO

Cervera's Position Bad.

HARDLY POSSIBLE FOR HIM TO ESCAPE

Feared That He Will Sink His Ships Before Surrendering.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Nothing has been received by the Navy Department to throw any light upon the engagement at Santiago.

The probability is that Cervera, knowing that the army was about to invade Santiago and that the navy force in front of him was apt to be increased so as to render the possibility of his victory slim or remote, became desperate and made a dash for liberty.

It is known that he sent a couple of torpedo boats out of the harbor on Monday night to reconnoitre but they were promptly discovered and forced back.

It is quite likely that following this strategy the Spanish Commander ordered the Cristobal Colon to move out to the entrance of the harbor in order to learn what chance he had of making an effective dash with his entire fleet and that the Americans opened fire on both cruiser and outer fortifications.

Press despatches indicate that a Spanish warship was driven back and great damage done to the forts.

It is feared here, as a result of this setback, that the Spanish will sink their entire fleet rather than be compelled to surrender to the Americans after a conflict or be starved into doing it.

**LATER.**

## SAMPSON HAS JOINED SCHLEY.

Santiago Isn't Manilla.

AMERICANS WILL NOT ATTACK IT AGAIN.

Until the Invading Force is Ready to Land.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Notwithstanding the fact that Sampson has now formed a junction with Schley and that their massive fleet is now in front of the enemy, there is no likelihood that any aggressive steps will be taken until the military expedition arrives at Santiago.

The expedition is now on the way.

It has left Tampa, although the Department has aimed to keep the fact secret, and comprises 20,000 troops. Probably 50,000 more will follow.

The fact that Sampson is near Santiago was learned by the Navy Department yesterday through advices from him at Mole St. Nicholas.

He has with him a splendid fleet of ships, leaving at Havana only enough vessels to make the blockade effective, and assembling at Tampa the few ships necessary for convoys for the transports.

## ASSAULTED BY SPANIARDS.

Yesterday was closing day. The Alumni Society reelected Lt. Governor McClellan President and Rev. Dr. Brecken Vice-President. Mr. A. N. Archibald, Chief Preceptress of the Ladies College, was reelected a member of the Board of Regents of the University.

Twenty candidates received the degree of B. A. Among them were included the following:—Daniel Robert Chown, Winsloe; Samuel Burns Enman, Pownal; and Miss Annie Sprague, Summerside who was valedictorian.

The degree of M. A. was conferred on eight former B. A.'s, Miss Bessie Alexander Stanhope, (B. A. '96) being one of them.

The degree of D. C. L. was conferred on the Hon. A. McClellan, Lieut-Governor of New Brunswick, an old Sackville student. He delivered an address in which he spoke in high terms of Mount Allison College and the excellent opportunities enjoyed by the young people of the present day.

Eastern Notes.

The weather has been so fine and clear the last two weeks that most of the farmers have finishing seeding.

Oats and potatoes being very scarce the ruling prices are sixty and fifty cents respectively.

Lobsters are very scarce. Some of the packers intend closing their factories this week, if the fishing does not get better. Generally speaking the pack so far is only half that of last year for the same period. Codfish are plentiful on the North side and are a good price.

The Camp for the Eastern Artillery men will likely be held about the last of June, although some rumor say September. We trust this rumor is not correct. There is a lull in farm work about the last of June which does not occur in September, and as the Eastern Artillerymen are mostly farmers and cannot attend camp in September the ranks will have to be filled with recruits. Then woe to the honors won last year by King's County, and the efficient standing of our rural corps with an awkward squad in every other camp

## SENATE DISCUSSES FRANCHISE BILL

Senator Ferguson Objects

TO SEVERAL CLAUSES OF THE BILL.

For Which New Clauses Will be drafted.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 2.—The Senate in committee on the Franchise Bill yesterday.

Senator Ferguson showed that three clauses, at least, could not be applied to the conditions in Prince Edward Island. The clause defining the meaning of polling sections was amended to meet Senator Ferguson's objections. His objection to another clause relating to the form of oath led Mr. Mills to promise to draft a special oath to meet the case. On a clause applying to the place where non resident voters should be polled, Senator Ferguson showed that the system of special votes prevailing in P. E. Island could not be fitted on with this provision. The clause stood over.
