Fisheries Federation Seeking New District

Establishment of Prince Edward Island as a separate inspection district was sought in a resolution approved at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation held yesterday. Moved by S.H. Burhoe and seconded by Paul Gallant the resolution was adopted unanimously.

The sponsors of the motion pointed out that since the province was a distinct unit in so far as protection was concerned it was unfair to expect the greatest efficiency in inspection which was administered from Shediac, N.B.

SPLIT VOTE
A move to require all packs of lobster to be dated and packed registered in a split vote and the pre-

sident J.E. Burden—decided to shelve the motion until the next meeting of the federation. Chief objection was the cost of the machinery involved.

Paul Gallant, president of East-pack, Souris, was named the president of the federation. Other officers chosen yesterday include L. L. Noonan, DeBlols Brothers, vice-president; and A.W. Gaudet, secretary-treasurer (re-elected).

J.E. Burden of the J.W. Windsor Co., is the immediate past president.

The federation's new directors are: W. Graham, Gaspereaux, and P. Gallant, Souris for Kings; Gerry Buote, Tignish and Ulric Polier, Abram's Village for Prince, and S.H. Burhoe and Joseph Gaudin, North Rustico for Queens.

The directors-at-large named yesterday are: Harvey Hutt, Al-

berton; H.T. Fraser, Murray Har-

bor. In the course of his annual report Mr. Burden welcomed five new firms to membership in the federation. These were Fishermen's Union No. 4, Desjardins Limited, Acadia Fishermen's Co-op, North Rustico Fishermen's Co-op, and Keeping and MacKay Ltd.

Mr. Burden said that consideration and discussion of many matters had occupied the federation during the year. These included: an attempt to have dried weight for canned chicken had die reduced from the present 12 ozs. to 12 ozs. in cans of ozs. net weight; a review of the potential for Canadian lobster in Europe air-lifted via MCA; the paving of roads leading to poaching problems; mobile inspection laboratories; unemployment insurance regulations; and coding and dating regulations for canned lobster.

The balance of the sessions was taken up with routine business.

Wife Of Former Sheriff Fatally Injured At S'side

Taken to hospital following a car-truck collision here yesterday morning, Mrs. Edwin B. Reid of Rollo Bay died in the Prince County Hospital yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. Reid was a passenger in a 1959 Stuevaker Lark, driven by her husband, which was involved in a collision with a three-and-one-half ton truck, owned by the Town, was driven by Ernest

Paynter of Summerside. Also a passenger in the Reid vehicle was Mrs. S.D. Reid of Summerside who was taken to hospital along with the other two occupants where she was treated for cuts and bruises and later released.

Mr. Reid, former King's County Sheriff, suffered rib injuries and a scalp cut and was released last night. Mrs. Edwin Reid, who had apparently been recovering

from a severe cold, died suddenly in hospital. Mrs. Reid, who was a life-time resident of Rollo Bay, was in her 74th year.

Besides her husband she is survived by six children, Willard, New Reigel, Ohio; Ernest D. Charlottetown; Lois, Mrs. G.I. Howard, Moncton; Francis, Mrs. L.H. Clifton, Moncton; and Major Reid, Rollo Bay.

She is also survived by three brothers, Ernest Francis, Milton Mass.; Robert D. Francis, Los-toria, Ohio; and George H. Francis in Moncton.

Another son, Lieut. Sterling Reid, was killed overseas in the Second World War.

An inquest was convened last evening by Coroner Dr. Charles Dewar of O'Leary and was adjourned until a later date.

Members of the jury are Ralph Dodds, foreman; Heath Warren, Roger Worth, Jack Schurman, Edward Poole, George Wotton and Arthur Pratt.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

Former Brain Injury Fatal For S'side Man

A young Summerside man, Mark Delaney, age 22, was found dead in a ditch at Aulac, N.B. about 4.30 p.m. yesterday afternoon and an autopsy revealed that death had resulted from a brain haemorrhage.

Mark had suffered a severe head and brain injury five years ago in an automobile accident while playing hockey with a team at Aylmer, Ont. A metal plate installed in his skull at that time had been removed last February, and he had been planning to have another plate installed.

Yesterday morning he left Moncton where he had been visiting briefly at the home of his uncle, Dr. Austin Delaney, enroute to his home in Summerside when his death occurred.

He had been subject to sudden and severe head pains, and on several occasions had collapsed in an unconscious condition due to his head injury.

Pending further information concerning his death it is presumed by relatives that he had travelled from Moncton to Aulac with someone by car, and had suffered an attack and fallen into the water-filled ditch while waiting to get a drive with some car coming to the Island.

Mark had spent most of his lifetime in Summerside, and had

attended Summerside High School and St. Dunstan's University.

During the past year or so he had been employed as a member of a survey crew, and recently had been working in this capacity at RCAF Station Summerside.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Carrol Delaney of Summerside, he is also survived by two sisters Marie, Mrs. Leo Bourgeois, Lynn, Mass.; Marsha, Mrs. Layton Schurman, Summerside; and one brother, Carl with the RCAF at Camp Borden, Ont.

Transferred from the mainland to the Bonness Funeral Home in Summerside, the funeral will be held on Tuesday morning at 9 a.m. from the St. Paul's Church, with interment in St. Paul's cemetery.

Closer Security Measures Taken

Tightening of all security regulations to prevent escapes from Prince County Jail is being undertaken by authorities At-torney General R.R. Bell, Q.C., said yesterday.

"We will be checking in much more closely," the minister said in reply to a query regarding the recent escape of two prisoners from the Summerside jail.

Larkin and Finn, the escapees who touched off the greatest manhunt in Island history, were recaptured by RCMP with the co-operation of other police agencies and citizens in general.

Of their escape, reportedly made by sawing their way to freedom, Mr. Bell said it had the "appearance of outside help." With no specific provision for the

searching of visitors, the attorney general said it "is hard to tell what may be brought in" to the jail by people calling on prisoners on visitors' day.
