

King Scores Winning Marker As Atlantics Edge Miners 6-5

GLACE BAY, N. S., Jan. 21 (CP) — Halifax Atlantics threw their last-minute scoring punch tonight for a 6-5 overtime victory over Glace Bay Miners in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here.

Frank King shot the winning marker at 4:38 of overtime play after Atlantics had fought their way out of a 5-3 deficit going into the third period.

Only one penalty was handed out in the free-scoring encounter. It went to Atlantics' Joe Lepine in the second period and didn't affect the scoring.

Miners ran up a quick lead on the opening frame on markers by Borde Miller, Bill McCracken and Connie Bonhomme. Hub MacLean added two more in the second while Frank Bergeron, Billy Good and Muckle Hollett were scoring for Halifax.

It was midway in the third period before Atlantics showed signs of cutting down the margin. Hugh Campbell scored from Hollett and Bob Hayes just past the 11-minute mark.

Hollett also drew an assist four minutes later on Carroll Blooms which sent the game into extra minutes.

The teams had nearly equal scoring chances. Roy McMeekin turned aside 32 shots in the Halifax nets while Don Lockhart stopped 32.

Gordie Howe, the great right winger of the Detroit Red Wings, appears well on his way towards breaking Maurice Richard's record of 50 goals in one season. The Detroit forward has come along strong of late and to date has scored 29 goals. He has 28 more left in which to break the record and everything seems to be riding in his favor. He has always been noted as a strong finisher and unless he meets up with an injury he should come close to the 50 goal mark.

If Howa breaks the record he will do it on a 70-game schedule. Richard set his record in a 50-game schedule, a scoring feat which probably never will be equalled in modern times. However in the early days of hockey there were some scoring records which were better than Richard's. Joe Malone set a record of 44 goals in twenty-two games. Newsy Lalonde scored 39 goals one year in eleven games and scored 440 goals altogether in his professional career in various leagues. Another old-timer Ernie Russell had 38 goals in twelve games.

Contrary to most arguments it would appear that a forward in the days of Malone and Lalonde had a better opportunity of scoring than a forward of today. The goal tender in those days was certainly easier to beat. The goalkeepers were not allowed the same width in their pads; they had to use much smaller gloves and they were not allowed to flop on a shot. Of course the goaltender was not faced with the red line threat as he is today.

Getting back to present day hockey and Howe, the Detroit winger will set another record this season if he can win the point scoring race. Should he win, Howe would be the first man ever to take three consecutive N. H. L. scoring championships. And unless bad luck overtakes him he will likely go on winning scoring crowns. At 24 he is just reaching the peak of his game. And it has been quite a game for a fellow who wasn't rated as much of a prospect when he was 14 years of age.

Howe's biggest fault is probably his lack of color. According to reports he is a mechanical type of player without the fire, dash or appeal of a Richard. For all his hockey ability Howe will probably never rank in a class with Richard when it comes to filling a rink. Even today when Richard is past his peak he could probably draw more people into a rink than the smooth skating Howe.

For a fellow whom some rate over the hill Richard is not doing too badly. He has 15 goals and 25 assists for a total of forty points which ranks him fourth in the scoring race and tops in the assist department. He is far ahead of the rest of his team in the point department and one of the main reasons why the Canadiens are only three points behind the Red Wings. And Richard has been hounded like no other player in hockey. It's small wonder that there are so many arguments on the Howe vs. Richard hockey question. That argument will be easier to settle when Howe reaches 31 years of age, the same age as Richard is now.

Tonight is hockey night in O'Leary and vicinity. Officials in the western section of the Province are predicting that a record breaking crowd will file into the O'Leary rink to watch the Islanders and Maroons go through their paces. Canadiens Score 1-0 Shutout Over Maple Leafs

TORONTO, Jan. 21 — (CP) — Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion, fast overcoming the traditional National Hockey League sophomore jinx, scored late in the first period tonight to give Montreal Canadiens a 1-0 win over Toronto Maple Leafs.

The big, burly Geoffrion tipped in the puck at 17:11 and the Canadiens went on a close checking performance that had the Leafs fuddled and gave netminder Gerry McNeil his seventh shutout of the season.

The victory gave the Canadiens a tighter hold on second place, three points behind the leading Detroit Red Wings, idle tonight. The Leafs remained in fourth place, two points behind Chicago and six points behind Canadiens.

Geoffrion, who won the Rookie of the Year, scored last year when he scored 30 goals, beat goal-tender Harry Lumley in such a way that it was probably the prettiest of the 18 goals he has rattled home this season.

He was standing nonchalantly at the left side of Lumley while players scrambled for the puck inside the Toronto Blue line. He flicked the puck into the net on a goal-mouth pass from Bert Olmstead.

It was one of those plays, labelled all the way by Defencemen Doug Harvey, passed it to Olmstead who, instead of shooting, drew aside a Toronto defender and pushed it over to Geoffrion.

That was the game and Canadiens played the rest of the way as if they had a dozen goals. Behind the nifty sweep checking of Johnny McCormack, they stopped the Leafs cold on every attack. Occasionally

Dizzy Dean, Al Simmons Added To Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 — (AP) — Jerome Herman (Dizzy) Dean, older of the St. Louis Cardinals' famous pitching brothers, and Al Simmons, who distinguished himself as a hard-hitting outfielder for the Philadelphia Athletics, were added today to baseball's Hall of Fame.

This pair of diamond greats became the 63rd and 64th to be added to the shrine at Cooperstown, N. Y.

For the second straight year Bill Terry, former first baseman and manager of the New York Giants, barely missed the honor. He fell seven votes short of nomination and was third in the balloting of baseball writers.

Terry was also third a year ago when Harry Heilmann and Paul Waner were named to baseball immortality.

A surprising turn in the election was the failure of Joe DiMaggio, the Yankee Clipper, to win a berth in his first year of eligibility. It had been freely predicted that DiMaggio, who retired in 1951 after a brilliant career with New York Yankees, was the most likely to be honored.

But DiMaggio finished eighth with 117 votes, 81 short of the number needed for success.

A total of 264 writers with 10 years' membership in the Baseball Writers Association of America participated in the votes. It took 75 per cent of the votes—or 198—to elect.

Dean, whose right arm appeared to be indistinguishable until 1937 when it began to fail him, received 209 votes. Simmons collected 199 votes.

Terry received 191 while 179 votes went to Bill Dickey, the Yankees' great catcher who now is serving as coach of the Bronx Bombers.

Dizzy Dean and his brother, Paul, formed a combination which pitched the St. Louis Cardinals into the World Series in 1934.

It was that year that Dizzy compiled a 30-7 record, the last 30-game winner of the major leagues.

After a toe accident in an all-star game, Dizzy's powerful arm lost its effectiveness and, after he was sold for \$185,000 to the Chicago Cubs in 1938, he never regained his oldtime form.

Dean's big league record showed 150 victories and 83 defeats. He set a modern National League record by striking out 17 Cubs on July 30, 1933.

Simmons compiled a lifetime batting average of .334 in a 20-year career which stretched from 1924 to 1944.

Most of his career was spent under Connie Mack with the Athletics, but he also played with Chicago, Detroit, Washington and Boston in the American League and Boston and Cincinnati in the National.

Simmons won the American League batting championship with the Athletics in 1930 and again in 1931. He hit 381 and 390 in those years, respectively.
