

Canada Will Have New Ideas To Offer On Berlin Crisis

OTTAWA (CP)—External Affairs Minister Smith said Sunday night that Canada will have further ideas to offer in the West-ern counter-proposals to the Russian proposal on the Berlin situation.

He said in an interview on his return from the NATO council meeting in Paris that Canada made known its ideas on the German question to the Big Three Western powers and that it would have more to present before the West makes its formal counter-proposals to the Soviet Union late next month.

Mr. Smith said that the Canadian government fully supported the view that the West reject Russia's proposal to demilitarize Berlin.

However, the West should negotiate and have counter-proposals ready soon.

Defence Minister Peakes said the future of the RCAF Air Division in Europe will depend on the integration of European air forces in NATO.

MADE PROGRESS

There had been progress toward integration but the Europeans had no system comparable to the Canada-U. S. North American Air Defence Command.

Mr. Peakes said the situation had not yet reached the point where new equipment for the aid division could be determined now.

The division comprises 12 fighter squadrons equipped with Sabre and CF-100 jets.

Mr. Peakes and Mr. Smith returned from London in an RCAF jet comet airliner.

They were accompanied by the Hon. George Drew, Canadian High Commissioner in London, and Mrs. Drew.

"We're going to spend a good old-fashioned Christmas in Guelph," Mr. Drew said.

Ingrid Bergman Weds Swedish Businessman

LONDON (AP)—Actress Ingrid Bergman and Swedish businessman Lars Schmidt were married in a London registry office Sunday.

The announcement was made by S. Bernstein, chairman of British Granada Television, two hours after the couple left for Paris.

At the time of the departure neither Ingrid nor Schmidt would comment even on the possibility of a wedding.

The Swedish actress' marriage to Italian film producer Roberto Rossellini was annulled by a Rome district court last July.

The state prosecutor has appealed the decision and a hearing is set for Feb. 3.

A spokesman for Bernstein said the British Commercial Television chief, solicitor Ambrose Applebe and Baron Goran Von Essen of Gothenburg, were witnesses at the wedding.

Bernstein's spokesman said the marriage "received the benediction and blessing by the Vicar of the Swedish church in London."

Miss Bergman's first marriage was to Swedish doctor Peter Lindstrom. They had a daughter, Pia.

By her second marriage, to Rossellini, she had three children. They are Roberto, 9, and six-year-old twins Ingrid and Isabella.

The controversy surrounding her 1950 romance with Rossellini failed to harm the actress' career. She never left show business and with recent movies like *Inn of the Sixth Happiness* has never been going stronger.

Canadian Coverage By U.S. Papers Shows Improvement

WASHINGTON (CP)—Two congressmen reporting on a study of Canada - United States relations reported today that U.S. newspapers seem to be giving "broader coverage" to Canadian problems.

But, at the same time, they suggested that the U.S. press evaluate their current policies and practices on newsgathering in Canada and the handling of news copy from there.

Greater coverage of the Canadian scene by U.S. newspapers could lead to better relationships between the two countries, said Congressmen Brooks Hays (Dem. Ark.) and Frank Coffin (Dem. Me.) in a report prepared for the House of Representatives foreign affairs committee.

Last May, in an earlier report on Canada-U.S. affairs, the two congressmen criticized U.S. newspapers for the lack of adequate press coverage of Canadian affairs in the U.S.

PROBLEM RECOGNIZED

In today's report they said: "We recognize that this objective can be gained only by adequate newsgathering on the scene and adequate handling of the copy filed. We think that the United States press would do well to re-evaluate its current policies and practices in both these areas.

"To the extent that there can be greater coverage of the Canadian scene by the American press there will be more chance of developing attitudes on the part of the American people and Congress that will make possible an easier continuing relationship between the two countries."

EDITOR CONCERNED

But they hesitated to "prescribe for the press" and "merely" wished to "report and commend a suggestion given us by a concerned Canadian editor."

"This suggestion was that some widely representative professional group such as the society of American newspaper editors place the subject of coverage of Canadian news high on the agenda of one of its meetings and invite representative Canadian and United States reporters and editors to speak on the subject."
