Licence Charges Net \$125 Fine

SUMMERSIDE — A New Brunswick transport firm, MacAulay's Transfer (Western) Ltd., Centerville, was fined a total of \$125 and costs on five separate charges under the provincial motor carrier act by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court yesterday.

The firm was originally charged under the Federal Motor Transport firm under the Provincial Act.

The charges read that the firm "did unlawfully operate a public motor truck within the province without holding a license from the Public Utilities Commission authorizing such operation."

The offences took place between February 17 and March 8th of this year. The fine was \$25 and costs on each charge.

J. Melville Campbell represented the firm and George R. McMahon acted for the crown.

A Millvale, P.E.I. couple, George Sheldon Stewart and Lois May Stewart found guilty at a previous hearing of charges of obstruction of police officer in the performance of his duty, were sentenced by Magistrate MacDonald yesterday.

Mr. Stewart was fined \$200 and costs or 30 days and in passing sentence Magistrate MacDonald stated "My feeling is and always was, that a police officer must be protected at all times in the performance of his duty."

In fining Mrs. Stewart the sum

of \$10 the magistrate stated he felt she was the victim of circumstances and had probably learned a lesson from this experience.

The crown proceeded "ex parte" in the case of James Joseph Christopher, Harper Road, charged with impaired driving. The accused had entered a not guilty plea at a previous hearing and the case had been set for yesterday for trial.

The arresting officer, RCMP Constable John K. Greer of Alberton, gave evidence for the crown and upon completion of the testimony the magistrate found the accused guilty as charged and assessed a fine of \$75 and costs.

Election Grapevine Buzzing With Rumors

The election grapevine is already in high gear with names of potential Progressive Conservative candidates for all six districts of Queens County being circulated.

There is little likelihood of any nominating convention opposition for the eight sitting conservative members, many of them cabinet ministers, in the first, second, third and sixth districts. The word is that Premier Walter B. Shaw and Frank Myers will be contesting their first district seats, industry minister Lloyd MacPhail and highways minister Philip Matheson will be the only names before the second district convention and agriculture minister Andrew MacRae and Russell Driscoll will re-enter in third district. Sixth district will again see J. David Stewart and provincial treasurer M.A. Farmer.

The fourth and fifth districts will be horses of a different color or however. No less than an even dozen names are being mentioned for the fifth district and four in the fourth district. One of the names most mentioned in both districts is that of H. Bennett Carr, city insurance man and active conservative of long standing. It is understood that Mr. Carr has been approached by people in the fifth district to run in the city and he is known to have been asked to go before the fourth district. Indications are he may choose fourth district but Mr. Carr was not available for comment.

Assuming he goes fourth district he will probably be contesting the nomination with Sinclair McTavish, a farmer from Newton Cross, Dan Compton, Belle River merchant and Norman MacMillan, a farmer from

Albany Plains. The fourth district convention is slated for Monday night at Eldon.

A vast selection of candidates will be available to voting delegates at the fifth district convention in their selection of two men for the key Charlottetown district contest.

The grapevine suggests the names of lawyer A.W. Gaudet, former Charlottetown mayor, city businessman Wes Storey, retailer and city council member Arthur Wright, Ivan Kerry, Sherwood, a feed dealer, a horse fieldworker Gordon MacDonald, father of Prince MP David MacDonald, city doctor Allan MacMillan, provincial party organizer James Lee, Sherwood, city insurance man A.R. MacInnis, who is former provincial YPC president, J.N. Kenney, Charlottetown, president of P.E.I. PC Association and Jack MacEachern of Charlottetown, as well as Mr. Carr. The first woman to put her name on the PC ticket in Queens may also offer. She is Mrs. Mary McQuaid, wife of Charlottetown lawyer Charles R. McQuaid.

The conventions for the fifth and sixth districts may be held jointly but whether the fifth district meeting is held separately

in connection with the sixth it should prove to be one of the most interesting of this campaign with one of the two most vital seats in this election in question.

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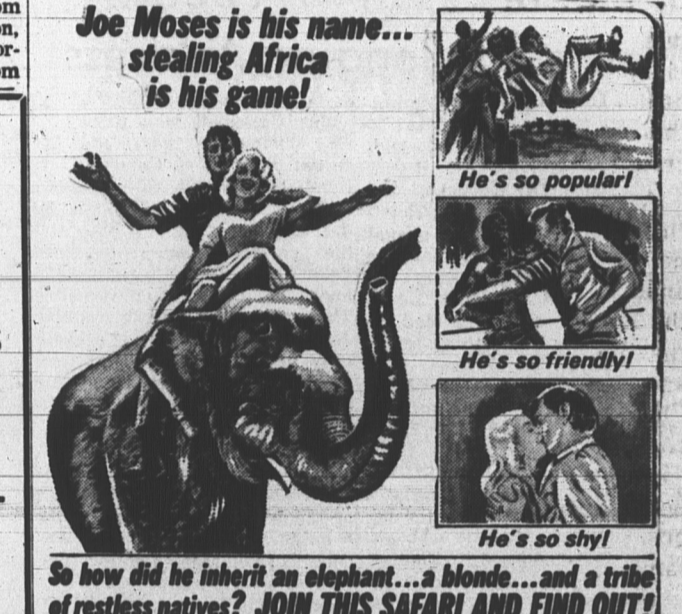
