THE SERBIAN WAR.

LONDON, Nov. 22. The Constantinople correspondent says that the Turkish Government has warned Serbia to withdraw her troops from Bulgaria or the Turkish troops will invade Serbia.

BELGRADE, Nov. 22. A rumor is current here that Siviuitza has fallen, but no official confirmation has been received.

Despatches to the Daily Telegraph from Simla says: "The defeat of Serbian troops are due to the defective outposting and over confidence. Three thousand two hundred Serbian reinforcements are due at Pirot on Monday."

A despatch to the Standard from Pirot says: "It appears to be impossible to capture Siviuitza until Sofia has been, which would enable the Serbians to attack Siviuitza from the rear. Both armies are badly clad for a winter campaign."

A collision between the English-speaking citizens and the French mob was only prevented last night by a strong exhibition of the police, as the latter were determined to visit the west end and raise a disturbance among the English speaking citizens.

The Riel Demonstration Unsuccessful.

MONTREAL, Nov. 22.

The demonstration to-day was not as great a success as the promoters hoped, only a tithe of the hundred thousand expected turning out, and those for the greater part drawn from curiosity.

At St. Patrick's, in the morning, Father Dowd delivered an eloquent and impressive sermon, warning Irish Catholics to have nothing to do with the agitation, and commending strongly the action of the Government in carrying out the sentence of Riel.

The speeches were all of the most violent type, breathing denunciations against the Government, the French Ministers particularly, and the English speaking population generally. Mercier, Leader of the Liberals in Quebec, stated he had written Hon. Mr. Chapleau, offering to resign the Leadership of the national party in his favor if Chapleau would "throw up his portfolio, but the Secretary of State had replied that the Government would stand or fall by its acts; that none of the French Ministers would resign, and that Riel thoroughly deserved his fate.

Resolutions were passed condemning the murder of Riel; that the rebellion was in their opinion justifiable, and as he was a French-Canadian his life should have been spared, because all his race demanded it.

The principal speakers were Senators Trudel and Malhot, Messrs. Mercier and Beaudin, M. P.'s. Wilfred Laurier, Legislative Councillor Turcotte, and Beaudry, and Messrs. Cursol, Vanasse, Bergeron, Tarte and Desjardines, M. P's.

The Liberals were much more violent than the Conservatives.

Two Terrible Cyclones.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

A terrible cyclone swept over the Philippine Islands, Friday, eight thousand buildings, including numerous churches and schoolhouses were destroyed, and twenty-two persons killed.

LONDON, Nov. 23.

Despatches to the Times from Calcutta, says that five thousand people have been drowned, and a hundred and fifty villages submerged in Orissa by a cyclone, and that 1241 square miles in Moorshedabad and Hudda districts have been devastated.

J. W. Cudlip Fatally Burned.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Nov. 23.

J. W. Cudlip, Inspector of Customs, was fatally burned on Saturday evening by bed clothing catching fire from a lamp while he was reading in bed. He died at 3 o'clock on Sunday morning.

The project of excavating a tunnel through Stimpson for a new railway between Italy and Switzerland is near to its realization. The Italian Government promises its co-operation, and the works will be begun next year. The proposed railway line will be 32 1/2 miles long, of which 7 1/2 miles will pass through the tunnel; it will cost \$13,000,000, and its completion will take 10 years, more than 6 years being required for excavation of the tunnel. On the Switzerland side the tunnel will be 2,260 feet, and on the Italian, 2,656 feet above the sea level.
