

Amherst Ramblers Score 8-3 Win Over Islanders

A fast-skating, smooth passing crew of Amherst Ramblers solidly trounced the Prince Edward Islanders 8-3 to keep the local team off the ACSHL with a top-sided encounter at the Forum Saturday night. The Ramblers, led by F. Bernoquez's three-goal performance, were never behind as they led 3-2 at the end of the first, 4-3 at the end of the second and exploded with four goals in the final frame as the Islanders lost all control over the visitors.

The Islanders, who were playing their second consecutive game after a bus trip to the New Brunswick capital, played the best hockey in the first 25 minutes of play as they battled the surprising team of the league for goal. However, the visitors never let up and after the 6:45 mark of the second frame banged in five unanswered goals as the Islanders tried hopelessly, time after time, to get a rally started. Jim Shirley, playing his second sensational game for the local club, had no chance on the ones that passed him as he was left with two and three Ramblers in front of him and in the clear several times.

F. Bernoquez, speedy Amherst center, opened the scoring at the 7:14 as he and Therrien were put in the clear on a pass from Gagnon shortly after Johnny Morrow failed to beat Lacoursiere on a short break away. Van-e Harris, playing his first game with the Islanders, tied the score four minutes later on a pass from Dowling and Purcell with Kiley in the penalty box. It was followed by two Amherst tallies and as the period ended the score was 3-2 with Ray LeDuc getting Islanders' second marker at 17:54.

Buck Whitlock made it 3-1 at the 6:45 mark of the middle as he rounded out the local club's scoring on a pass from Brklaciach and Campbell during a scramble in front of Lacoursiere. The period was penalty-free after a stiff start. My session in which referees Taylor and Kane handed out a total of eight minors—five to Amherst and three to Islanders. Amherst coach Lou Kiley was the bad boy of the night as he was tagged for

minor infractions three times in the first period.

The game left Ramblers in second place in the newly formed league with one win and a tie for three points, one behind the Capitals who have two victories in the week-old schedule.

The Islanders will journey to Amherst for a game tonight and both teams will tangle at the Forum on Tuesday. New on the local team is forward Normand Carpentier from Valleyfield, Quebec, who arrived in the city Saturday. Bob Gray and Guy Gignac are due in camp shortly.

Rangers Down Canadiens 4-2 In Uphill Battle

NEW YORK (AP)—Paul Ronny, late in the third period broke 2-2 deadlock and Danny Lewicki edged another tally with 20 seconds remaining to give New York Rangers an uphill 4-2 victory over the league-leading Montreal Canadiens at Madison Square Garden Sunday night. The triumph boosted Patrick's Broadway Blues to within three points of first place.

The game was a complete reversal over Saturday night's contest when the Canadiens trimmed the Rangers 7-1 in Montreal. The puny New Yorkers put on a last period scoring spurt after both clubs ended the period tied 1-1.

Andy Bathgate put the Rangers briefly ahead with an unassisted goal with only 47 seconds gone in the third period. It was his second goal of the night. Ken Mosdell vend the count 2-2 at 3:16 and that's how the score stood until the late moments of the game.

At 16:40 Ronny swooped around the Montreal net and slapped the puck past goalie Jacques Plante. The Canadiens, in a vain effort to deadlock the score, pulled Plante from the ice in the last minute. The strategy backfired, however, as Lewicki stole the puck and fired into the empty net for the clincher.

The Canadiens wasted little time in scoring as Doug Harvey drilled home a 35-footer at 2:13 of the first period with the Rangers short-handed. The New Yorkers tied the score at 13:55 of the second stanza on Bathgate's first goal of the night.

U. S. Defeats Canada In Hoop Opener

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—The United States defeated Canada 59-37 as the world basketball tournament began here Saturday night. Canada, represented by Winnipeg Canadians, trailed throughout the game against Peoria Caterpillars. The Canadians had been rated one of the main threats to the favored U. S. in the 12-nation event. But the decisive victory clearly stamped the Illinois team as the one to beat.

Kirby Minter of the U. S. was high scorer with 16 points. He was followed by Carl Ridd, six-foot-four veteran of Olympic play and one of Canada's best players, with 11 points.

The Caterpillars took the lead from the start and held it throughout. They led 31-18 at the half after the Canadians had come within six points of the Americans.

In the first game of the program The Philippines defeated Paraguay 64-52.

Russian Runner Breaks Record

VIENNA (AP)—Vladimir Kuc-Russia's great distance runner, smashed the world record for 5,000 metres, easily defeating Czechoslovakia's Emil Zatopek at a track and field meet between the two countries in Prague, Radio Prague said Saturday.

Kuc sped the distance in 13:51, four-tenths of a second under the mark set by London's Chris Chataway 10 days ago. The 5,000 metres is equivalent to three miles, 188 yards.

It was the third straight time Kuc had beaten the official world record of 13:47.2 for the 5,000 held by Zatopek.

Welshmen Defeat Mount A 4-0

Prince of Wales College defeated Mount Allison's junior rugby team 4-0 Saturday in an exhibition game at Sackville. It left the Welshmen without a loss in this season's play as team captain Gordon Tweedy collected their points on two penalty kicks in the first half.

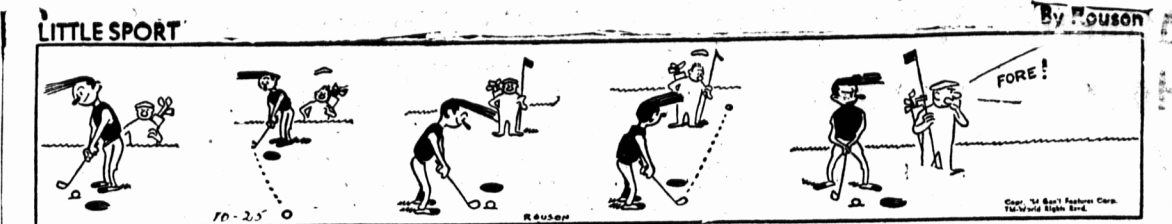

STELLARTON, N.S. (CP)—Halifax Wolverines' application was accepted and Stellarton Royals and Pictou Maripacs amalgamated at an Antigonish-Pictou-Colchester Senior Hockey League meeting here Sunday.

Touro Bears, New Glasgow, St. Francis Xavier University, Halifax and the new Pictou Royals will comprise the league, which begins its 40-game schedule Nov. 20 with Pictou at Halifax.

Because of studies, St. FX will play 16 games, with a win being worth four points.

Halifax, represented by alderman J. E. (Gee) Ahern and coach Rocky Sullivan, agreed to pay five cents to visiting teams on each rush and children's seat and 10 cents for reserve.

Montague Woman Draws Horse In Sweepstakes

MONTREAL (CP)—A total of 215 Canadians drew Irish Hospital sweepstakes tickets on the Cambridge race to be run at Newmarket, England, next Wednesday. Money in the drawing took place in Dublin and information on Canadian ticket-holders was forwarded today by cable to Montreal.

The Canadians will share in a prize fund of \$5,488,000, the highest in 20 years. The drawing was on 81 horses—runners and non-runners—entered.

The fund will provide 15 first prizes of \$140,000; 15 second prizes of \$56,000, and 15 thirds of \$28,000. In addition there will be 1,170 prizes of \$1,075 for holders of tickets on horses that either do not run or are not among the first three in the race. There will be 1,050 cash prizes of \$280 each, 4,500 consolation prizes of \$28 each, and 30 residual prizes of \$4,898.

Local Naval Officer On Historic Arctic Voyage



HMCS Labrador, the RCN's new Arctic patrol ship, is now well into the second half of a historic voyage which, when completed, will have seen the 6,500-ton vessel completely circumnavigate the North American continent. She made history by being the first warship to smash her way from east to west through the fabled, ice-packed Northwest Passage in Canada's vast arctic region. Commanded by Capt. O. C. S. Robertson, of Montreal and Halifax, the Labrador left Halifax July 23, and reached Esquimalt, B. C., September 27. She is now returning to Halifax via the Panama Canal, and due at her home port late in November. While in the Arctic daily weather maps were received by the Labrador by means of a facsimile transceiver. Here, Ldg.
