MISCOUCHE

MISCOUCHE — Residents of Miscoche were told last night at the annual meeting of the village commissioners that the installation of a sewerage system in the village last year had cost only \$45,500.

The estimate given by the engineering firm was \$75,000 and the total cost came to \$75,000. The resident note that in most cases an estimate of this nature runs much lower than the eventual cost and he commended the commission for staying so close to the original estimate.

It was noted that approximately 75 homes, a shade better than half the homes in the village, are connected to the system. Storm sewers were suggested that a brief be drafted by the residents and the commission to the departments requesting storm sewers wherever sidewalks are installed within the boundaries of the village.

The fire chief said that the fire department had a fairly quiet year, receiving only eight village calls and 19 calls outside the village. He mentioned that the only serious fire was at the Phillips home in the village in which both Mr. and Mrs. Turnbull suffered fatal injuries.

The chief suggested that residents of the village other than the 24 volunteer firemen should turn out every Monday night at the fire hall to learn how to operate the trucks in case of an emergency when regular firemen would not be available.

The village fire department charges fees for fire protection. In improvements it was noted that 10 new street lights had been installed and for the coming year it was decided to install sidewalks and rail to be started in the near future.

Rollie Graham, retiring commissioner, was replaced by John Clary. Other members of the commission are Earl MacDonald, chairman, and Fred Itanase as chairman.

CARDIGAN

CARDIGAN — The Cardigan village commissioners annual meeting had representative group present. Neil Wilson presided and the village clerk is Earl MacDonald.

The rate of 1/2 of 1 per cent remains unchanged and the commission reported a surplus of \$28.20 for the year 1963 with an unearned surplus from 1962 of \$75.90 making a total of \$467 on hand.

In improvements for the year the placing of two additional street lights and the paving of the road to the school were noted. In 1964 the commission hopes to install paving from the school and also from the CNR station to the village limits.

Civil Defence Course Set For S'side, Ch'town

On Wednesday, Feb. 5, and 12, civil defence courses will be conducted at Summerside and Charlottetown respectively. The courses will be held in the Civic Auditorium in Summerside, and in the National Fire Board theatre, Dominion Building, Charlottetown.

The group will be divided into syndicates to study specific problems relating to responsibilities at the municipal level, such as location of civil defence headquarters, evacuation procedures, communication, priority of such services as fire, rescue, police, medical and welfare.

The course is designed as a study group to deal with problems at the local and municipal level. The group will be divided into syndicates to study specific problems relating to responsibilities at the municipal level.

Two new members were elected to the commission. Maurice Gaudet was elected for an one-year term, succeeding Abner Gaudet who resigned after having completed two years of a three-year term.

Description Of World's Fair Site Given S'side Trade Bd.

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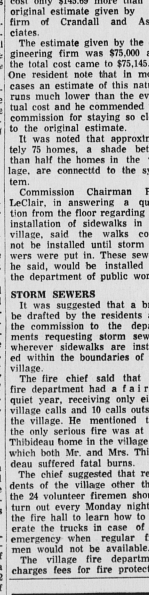
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
