Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint

The Summerside Water and Sewerage Commission a board which up to a month or so ago was probably unknown to some of the town's citizens, is very much in the limelight now. Many of the citizens who did know of its existence probably had only a vague idea of its duties. The newspaper controversy which flared up just before the civic election has changed all that. The three-man commission split wide open in the manner in which various contracts were let by the commission, and the potential value of a certain recently drilled well. Commissioners Stewart and Dewar were on one side and Commissioner Delaney on the other. Commissioner Stewart was returned to office in the election, and so the personnel of the Commission remains unchanged.

The dispute, like most controversies of this kind, settled nothing, leaving the general public more or less bemused as to the relative merits of the arguments, and the disputants apparently more convinced than ever that they were right. It did have the salutary effect, however, of bringing the Water and Sewerage Commission into the spotlight of public interest, and thus leading to the second act in the civic drama. Anything the Commission does now is News with a capital N, so news reporters sought admission to the most recent regular meeting of the Board. They were barred from the meeting on the grounds that very little business was on the agenda, but one member of the Commission later indicated that several contentious bills were presented for payment. It is not the intention of this column to take sides in the controversy. We do not know whether the business transacted at the meeting was important or trivial. That is not the point. The important thing is that if the Board spends the taxpayers' money and carries out business pertaining to the welfare of the citizens, then its deliberations should be open to the press at all times so that the people may know how their servants are administering the business of their household.

Another question comes to mind in discussing the Water and Sewerage Commission. Is this Board necessary at all? If the Town Council can administer our civic finances, a very large electric power utility, our fire department and other important matters of civic life, why can't it also handle our water and sewerage problems? Though it is true and deplorable that far too much of the really important work of the Council is conducted in caucus, at least no formal motions can be passed except in open meetings which every citizen is free to attend if he wishes. The Commission was set up in the first place to administer the bonds that were issued to pay for our first water system, but bonds of water and sewerage extensions are now issued in the name of the Town, so there isn't any further excuse for keeping the administration of water and sewerage outside the Town Council.
