Very Warm in Europe.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The weather in the south of England is phenomenally warm. The lowest point reached by the mercury in London yesterday was 58 degrees, which is 12 degrees below the average temperature of February. Despatches from France show that the weather there is even warmer than here. In Paris the thermometer registered 60 degrees and in Biarritz 72 degrees, which is quite unusual for February.

WHAT CAPTAIN SPAIN SAYS.—Captain Spain, commandant of the fisheries protection service, has returned to Ottawa from an inspection trip to various coast points in the Maritime Provinces. He says there are no United States fishermen in Canadian waters, but some are engaged in cod fishing on the Banks.
