Canadian-Born Horseman Passes Away In Maine

FORT FAIRFIELD, Me. (AP)—Stanley A. Wathen, Canadian-born dairy and horse racing enthusiast, died here Thursday after a brief illness. He was 67.

Wathen worked and played at the sulky sport for 35 years while leading one of Maine's biggest potato shipping firms. His racing interests were shared by his sons, Wendell, of Southern Pines, N. C., and Glendon, and Wendell's two sons, Wendell Jr. and Gary.

The S. A. Wathen and Sons stable's best known horse was Huck Volo, which broke the world record for the mile and one-half track in the winning the \$50,000 Nassau pace at Roosevelt Raceway in 3:05 3/5 in July, 1953. In that year, the stable won \$125,000.

Other Wathen horses were Feder and Mighty H.

Wathen's horses raced on tracks from Maine to Missouri, was the first president of the National Potato Industry Council and

past president of Aroostook Farms dairy at Presque Isle and National Vegetable Growers Association. He headed the First National Bank of Fort Fairfield and S. Nightingale and Co., potato growers and shippers.

Survivors include his widow, Beatrice Nightingale Wathen; two sons, Wendell and Glendon; a daughter, Mrs. Charles Guiney of Fort Fairfield; four brothers, Joseph J. of Easton, Me., Frederick of Stanley, N. B., Russell of Doaktown, N. B., and Murray of Stamford, Conn.; and three sisters, Mrs. Alice McMaster of Moncton, N. B., Mrs. Sarah Hildebrand of Saint John and Mrs. Bessie Holmes of Fort Frances, Ont.

Funeral services will be held from the Dorsey Funeral Home here at 2 p. m. Saturday.
