IN MEMORIAM

JOSEPH C. DOUGLAS

Residents of Savage Harbor and vicinity were saddened to learn of the death on March 15th of one of their oldest and most respected residents in the person of Joseph Coffin Douglas.

For the past 21 months he had been in failing health, and very little hope for a return to health was evident. However, through the many trying hours in which he lay in bed, he was never known to complain or become discouraged.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. William Douglas, he was born at Cherry Hill in 1870 where he spent the early part of his life until the passing of his mother in 1875, at which time he moved to Savage Harbor where he resided the rest of his life following the occupations of farming and fishing.

Josie, as he was familiarly known, was a kindly man whose home was always given to hospitality and who was always ready to help a friend and neighbor in need.

Mr. Douglas, the last member of his family, was predeceased a number of years ago by his sister, Cora, and two brothers, Nathan and William. Left to mourn his passing are his widow, formerly Gertrude T. Coffin, and his two children, Hubert of Dorchester, Mass., and Ada (Mrs. Wilfred Coffin), Savage Harbor; also nine grand children by all of whom he will be greatly missed.

He was visited during his illness by Rev. W. N. Byers who also conducted service at the house and grave. The funeral, which was largely attended, was held on Wednesday, March 18th at 2 o'clock, from the home. Interment was in Mt. Stewart Cemetery.

A mixed choir under the leadership of Mr. Roland Gay sang very beautifully, "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Jesus Saviour Pilot Me", and "Lead Kindly Light". At the close of the service the funeral cortege wended its way to the cemetery where all that was mortal of a good man was laid to rest.

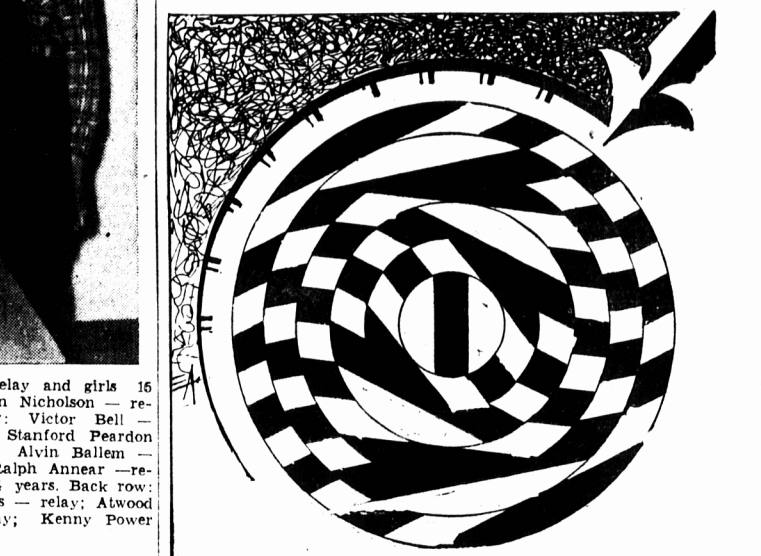
