That all men over 65 years of age will be henceforth exempt from payment of poll tax in the town of Montague was moved by the Town Council last night at their regular meeting held in the council room and presided over by His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo. Also an exemption of all municipal taxes was granted to the Legion Hall located in Montague.

During the meeting the Town Clerk read the minutes, bills, financial statement, and correspondence which constituted only routine matters.

With respect to those in arrears regarding the payment of \$100.00 for attaching to the town sewer, it was moved that a letter be sent to these persons giving notice of ten days to pay such arrears in full or to make satisfactory arrangements to pay same at the rate of \$25.00 per annum, and in default of payment or reply to letter, the

Following considerable discussion on the town fire equipment, it was moved that the fire engine would not leave the limits of the town, but that those fires outside the town limits which could be reached by the present hose would be attended, provided always that the engine was not taken outside the town limits.

The final discussion centered on the installation of buzzers in the homes of the members of the fire department to notify them of a fire. Two tenders were received and read. After further perusal of the matter, it was tabled to a further meeting. The meeting then adjourned.
