**New Tack Tried By Russians In Chinese Dispute**

MOSCOW (Reuters)—The Soviet press has resorted to a new tack in the bitter ideological struggle with China, reporting for the first time here more than 1,000,000 Chinese had fled to Hong Kong.

In a 1,800-word article describing conditions of poverty in the British colony, the government evening newspaper Izvestia accused the Chinese leadership of tolerating the colony as a "loophole into the capitalist world."

In a dispatch from Hong Kong, in Izvestia reporter decried poverty and prostitution in the colony and declared: "I cannot keep silent about the problem of the refugees."

**Conservatives Plan Study Conference**

OTTAWA (CP)—A national study conference by the Progressive Conservative party, the first it has held since 1942, is being scheduled for Sept. 9-12 in Fredericton. It was announced here.

More than 200 delegates will be invited to the meetings where they will pool their opinions on:

- Prospects for Confederation and Canadian unity; the role of the individual in a changing society.
- The role of government in developing the national economy.
- Canada's external relations, with emphasis on the future of the Commonwealth.

The topics were revealed by Dalton Camp, national president of the Progressive Conservative Association of Canada, who told a press conference the Fredericton meetings will provide a new vehicle for "Conservative-inclined intellectuals."

"I feel we have to develop a trained and informed people... and this will be a start," he said.

Except for evening "bull sessions," the entire conference would be open to the press. The meeting will be known as the national conference on Canadian unity.

Mr. Camp spoke to the Confederation Club.

H. Russell MacEwan (P.C.-Picton) sponsored a private member's motion that called for government consideration of a "more worthy designation."

His suggestion was that the term "senior citizens" be used. He knew many people over 65 who "certainly are not what one would call old."

What about "golden age," wondered George Lachance (L.-Montreal Lafontaine) who sponsored a similar motion a few years ago. At that time, he said, an Ottawa newspaper declared there was nothing dishonorable with old age and it hoped Mr. Lachance would get the word into the Commons.

That motion, like Wednesday's was "talked out" in the hour devoted to private members' business.
