**Demonstration of Starving Men.**

DUBLIN, Dec. 20.  
At Loughrea, yesterday, there was a procession of laborers, who demanded work or food.  
The Bishop distributed a sum of money among them.  
There is much distress in the district.

**Relations of France and China.**

LONDON, Dec. 20.  
The Chinese have evacuated Tonquin; and the relations between France and China are reported amicable.

**Storm and Wreck and Loss of Life.**

GLASGOW, Dec. 20.  
Three vessels have been wrecked on the coast of Scotland.  
The crews of each were drowned.  
The storm still continues to rage.

**Trade Extensions.**

BERLIN, Dec. 20.  
The river Weser is to be rendered navigable to the ocean, so that vessels may pass between Bremenhaven and Bremen.  
Thirty million marks are to be laid out in extending the trade between Germany and New York.

**Russia vs. Germany.**

LONDON, Dec. 20.  
Official advices state that the strained relations existing between Russia and Germany are receiving serious consideration at Berlin.

**Captives Let Free.**

LONDON, Dec. 20.  
All the political prisoners at Damietta have been released.

**GENERAL CABLE NEWS.**

MARYPORT, England, Dec. 18.  
The Hematite Iron Company have failed. Liabilities £200,000.

SANTOS, Dec. 18.

The British steamer "Crest," Capt. James, is totally wrecked on the Isle St. Sebastian. The crew were saved.

LONDON, Dec. 18.

The steamer "Clandon" from New Orleans for Bremen which went ashore at Peters Coast, off Holland, has been floated.

LONDON, Dec. 18.

The Times says obstacles have been raised to Lord Derby's appointment to the India office by reason of views he expressed in his recent speech at Manchester, in relation to Egypt.

TOLEDO, Dec. 19.

Saturday night the Wabash passenger train was ditched by a broken rail at Woodburn. Five persons were seriously injured.

LONDON, Dec. 18.

Parnell, in his speech at the banquet given at Cork yesterday, said he would always oppose any attempt of the Government to land immigrants in a helpless and penniless condition on the shores of the Eastern states of America. If, he said, England desired to promote emigration of Irishmen, let them be placed on land in America provided with houses and means to raise a crop the first year's residence.

MADRID, Dec. 18.

In the Chamber of Deputies, on Saturday, the Marquis de Sardeval, recently Senator Mori's Lieutenant, said he spoke in the name of all Democratic monarchial deputies except their late Chief Morot. Morot was thus publicly superseded in the leadership of the faction he instituted a year ago. Morot said he differed from De Sardeval in regard to two constitutions, but he would, on Monday, fully defend his reasons for joining Marshal Serrano.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.

A great fire occurred at Hong Kong Nov. 7th and 8th. Eight hundred houses were destroyed and many lives lost. The Vicroy went to the scene with soldiers to prevent robberies and fierce fights occurred between thieves and citizens.

LONDON, Dec. 18.

In consequence of Postmaster General Fawcett's satisfactory progress, bulletins reporting his condition will be issued less frequently.

DUBLIN, Dec. 18.

J. E. Redmond, member of Parliament, will go to Australia as a delegate from the Irish National League.

DUBLIN, Dec. 18.

Westgate was taken to the castle to-day and privately examined touching his confessed connection with the Phoenix Park Murders.

PARIS, Dec. 18.

The attack by Mountaineers in South-western China upon the Chinese troops who were marching against the French in which the rear guard was slaughtered is connected with a general rising in Yun Nan.

LONDON, Dec. 18.

The liabilities of six or nine tin plate firms which have failed in the past fortnight aggregate £900,000. The trade is completely paralyzed for the moment.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.

The wrestling match between Clarence Whistler and Joe Acton for \$2,500 and the championship, occurred to-night before an audience of 3,000, and was declared a draw, neither being able to secure a fall.

**The Concert Last Evening.**

DEAR SIR,—The concert last evening in the Y. M. C. A., was a success. The programme was a fair one, and well carried out. I would suggest to the manager of the next Concert that he commence on time. Generally they do. The Orchestral Club played several selections, very familiar now to a Charlottetown audience, capitally. One in particular in which the Highland Schottische is introduced. This brought, as one might expect, an *encore*. The solos were all well sung, particularly that of Miss Knight, who surpassed herself. Mr. Reid's song brought down the house; Messrs. Vinnicombe and Earle's solos on the violin and piano were as usual excellently and well rendered. The best part singing of the evening was by a few members of the Bible Christian Church Choir, assisted by Mr. Davidson and Mrs. Weir of the Methodist choir. Their voices were true and sweet and blended nicely together. They sang their piece, which was well received by the audience, in an artistic manner. The singing by the Methodist Choir under the direction of Prof. Frieze, was good. The time was excellent. Though the voices were harsh at times, occasionally they blended. There was a sad want of tenors and altos, which could not be heard at times at all. Mr. Freize has improved this choir very much of late. Mozart's "Gloria" has been sung five times already in this city, and has been much better sung and played and conducted, too, without the use of a stick. Mozart did not write his Masses for Protestants. He intended them to be sung in the Roman Catholic Church, and to be sung in Latin. The music is written note for note for the Latin. By all means let us have this kind of music in the future sung in Latin.
