Charlottetown's Old Spain Penguins are finally wearing the Maritime Junior hockey crown but not before defeating one team from New Brunswick and two from Nova Scotia.

The Penguins downed Gloucester Bay Miners 9-5 last night at the Sports Arena in a sudden-death game for the title. The Miners, previously led by Roy Link, Philip Simms, Hoyt's of Dartmouth in Nova Scotia playdowns, returned to their four goals. Controversial Faceoff

As In Prexy's Orders

MONTREAL (CP)—Clarence Campbell, president of the National Hockey League, said Wednesday a controversial faceoff in the third game of the Montreal playoff series was made on his orders.

The play occurred in the first period of Saturday's game at Montreal, in which the Leafs took out Canadiens 2-0. Most real centre Jean Beliveau was alone in the faceoff circle when linesman Ron Wicks dropped the puck.

"There was no mistake on the part of the linesman when he dropped the puck," Campbell said. "The officials were ordered to do this in order to galvanize Toronto into action."

At the time the Leafs already had a man short with Eddie Shack in the penalty box, were upset over a penalty to Carl Brewer. After waiting a few seconds, during which the Leafs made no move to put a man in the face-off circle with Beliveau, Wicks dropped the puck.

SHOTS ARE BOWER. Beliveau, who seemed to be surprised as anyone by the sudden change, hesitated a couple of seconds and then blasted a drive that goalie John Bower kicked aside. Referee Vera Campbell said "stalling" has become a Leafs tactic.

"They've done this at least three times when I've seen records of their own special form of protest. They've said a word, but will stall around."

He said no goal could have been allowed on the play, however, because some Toronto players were standing in front of their bench when the puck was dropped and were automatically offside.

"... What I hope this will do is force the Leafs to galvanize their players into action. If they didn't waste any time linking up for the faceoff after the puck was dropped."

Toronto coach Punch Imlach said "we weren't stalling in that game."

"I was just trying to make up my mind what player to send on the ice to take the face-off. You can't blame a man for that, can you?"
