P. E. ISLAND AFFAIRS.

Several representatives of Ontario spoke yesterday; and it was late in the night when Mr. Pope rose to ventilate the grievances of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Pope spoke briefly and effectively—though evidently without much preparation. After an interval Mr. Yeoo rose. He referred to the Fishery Award, and said he thought it was not so large as it ought to have been.

An Explanation.

It must therefore be evident to the public that it is utterly impossible for any person or persons to drag the Association into the questions and contentions of the day until its Constitution and Bye-Laws have undergone a radical change.

We think, therefore, that all must see that the charges referred to are entirely groundless and manifestly unfair.

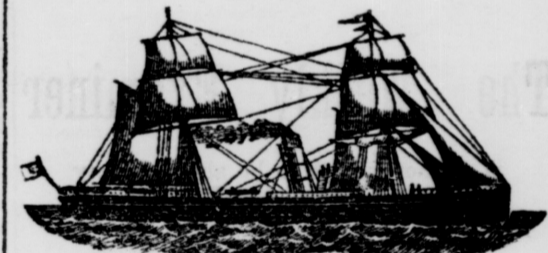
