Friends are pleased to see Mrs. H. S. MacEwen, home again after a short stay in the Charlottetown Hospital and all hope she enjoys better health in the future.

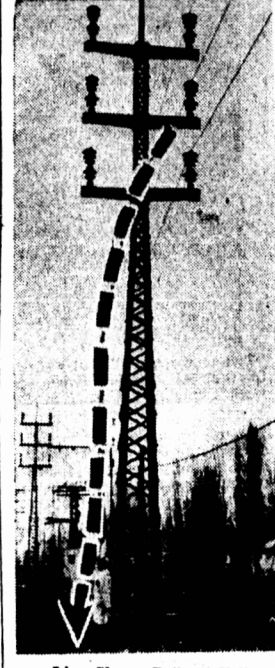

Stopped Heart Saved Boy's Life--Doctor

Line Shows Path of Fall

Momentary heart stoppage was credited with the possible saving of the life of nine-year-old Peter Penton, who touched a 13,000-volt hydro line and fell more than 30 feet, landing on the sands at Hamilton Beach. The boy's condition in the Hamilton General hospital is reported as "fairly good." Hydro officials said it was unusual that a person could survive such a shock and felt the child's heart must have stopped, causing him to lose his grasp. The shock of striking the ground, they added, may have restarted the heart. Heart specialists agreed that was possible. Playing with his older brother, Paul Penton, 10, and six neighborhood boys, Peter was the first to climb up tower, was followed by other comrades.
